3. *Special Collections*

The **Special Collections held in the Old Library** contain a **wealth of primary sources for historians**, as well as **early editions of key historical texts**. The early printed collections **span the fifteenth to eighteenth, and early nineteenth centuries**. Owing to the number of statesmen who passed through the College's doors in the sixteenth century, the collections are **particularly strong for Britain during the Tudor and Jacobean periods, as well as the Civil Wars of the seventeenth century**. The **development of the anti-slavery movement in Britain is also well represented**, as two Johnians, Thomas Clarkson and William Wilberforce, were at the forefront of its early campaigns. The collections as a whole are very broad-ranging, however, and provide ample material on topics as diverse as the European Reformation and Counter-Reformation, and the history of medicine. Please ask the **Special Collections Librarian**, if you would like to explore these resources further.
