

The Hon. JOHN FREDERICK GRUNING, C.I.E., died at Patna on October 3, 1922, aged 52. He was educated at Eastbourne College and at St John's, where he matriculated in 1892. The same year he entered the Indian Civil Service; he became Magistrate and Collector in 1906, and since 1917 had been Commissioner of the Orissa Division. He compiled for the Government of Bengal a Gazetteer of the Jalpaiguri district, which was published in 1911.

The Venerable PERCY HARRIS BOWERS (B.A. 1879), Archdeacon of Loughborough, died at his Rectory, Market Bosworth, Nuneaton, on November 15, 1922, after a long illness, aged 67. He was ordained in 1886, was curate successively of Fladbury and Leyland, and was presented to the rectory of Market Bosworth with Shenton in 1886. He became Rural Dean of Sparkenhoe in 1909, an Honorary Canon of Peterborough in 1913, and Warden of the Society of Missionary Clergy in the diocese in 1917.

The Rev. REGINALD ILLINGWORTH WOODHOUSE (B.A. 1877) died at Reigate on November 13, 1922, aged 68. He held curacies at Holy Trinity, Beckenham (1879-80) and at Kensington (1880-7), and was Vicar of St Luke's, Bromley Common, from 1887 to 1894. In the latter year he was collated by Archbishop Benson to the Rectory of Merstham. He edited in 1896 the poetical works of his ancestor James Woodhouse (1735-1820), "the poetical shoemaker".

In the Resignation Honours, October, 1922, the Rt. Hon. Sir Edward A. Gouling, Bt. (B.A. 1885), receives a Peerage. He will take the title of Baron Wargrave.

Mr James Donald (Matric. 1895), C.I.E., I.C.S., has been appointed a member of the Executive Council to the Governor of Bengal.

Mr. P. J. Grigg (B.A. 1912) has accompanied the British Financial Mission to the United States as Private Secretary to the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

Sir Edward Marshall-Hall, K.C. (B.A. 1883) has been elected Master of the Liners' Company.

Sir Humphrey Rolleston (B.A. 1886), has been appointed representative of the Royal College of Physicians on the General Medical Council.

The nominations to the Council of the Royal Society include the following members of the College:—Sir Arthur Schuster (Foreign Secretary), Professors V. H. Blackman, W. M. Hicks, and J. T. Wilson.

Mr A. Y. Campbell (B.A. 1907), formerly Fellow, has been appointed to the Gladstone Chair of Greek at Liverpool University.

Mr William W. C. Topley (B.A. 1907), M.D., F.R.C.P., M.R.C.S., has been appointed Professor of Bacteriology and Director of the Public Health Laboratory in the University of Manchester. He has also been appointed a representative of Manchester University on the Council of the Lister Institute of Preventive Medicine.

Mr L. J. Mordell (B.A. 1910) has been appointed to the Fielden Readership in Mathematics in the University of Manchester.

Mr R. Stoneley (B.A. 1915) has been appointed Curator of the Sheffield University Observatory.

On July 27, 1922, Mr W. G. Rushbrooke (B.A. 1872) retired from the Headmastership of St Olave's and St Saviour's Grammar School, Tower Bridge, which he had held since 1893. The prizes at the school Speech Day were distributed by Mr Asquith, who was a school-fellow of Mr Rushbrooke's at the City of London School, and who paid a warm tribute to the retiring head.

Mr Rushbrooke was sixth Classic in 1872, was elected to a Fellowship at St John's College in 1879, and was for 21 years classical master at his old school under Dr Abbott.

Mr H. W. Swift (B.A. 1920) has been appointed Demonstrator in Engineering at the University of Leeds.

Mr G. G. Coulton (B.A. 1881), Fellow, has been elected to an honorary Fellowship at St Catharine's College, of which he was formerly scholar.

The Hon. Sir Charles Parsons (B.A. 1877) has received the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Engineering in the University of Sheffield.

The Organ consists of three manuals, CC to G, 56 notes, and two-and-a-half octaves of radiating and concave pedals, CCC to F, 30 notes; 50 speaking stops and 8 couplers, etc., making a total of 58 drawstops. It was originally built in 1635 by Robert Dallam, of Westminster, and re-built in 1839, by Messrs. Hill. Further alterations and additions were made by Messrs. Hill in 1868 and also in 1889, and by Messrs. Norman and Beard in 1902. The Organ has now been re-built (1922) by Messrs. Harrison and Harrison.

THE BATHS.—Perhaps the most striking innovation of the Term has been the successful opening of the College baths. These are approached by B, New Court, and occupy the site of the old chemical laboratories, the embryo ever associated with the name of our President, from which has grown the great new building in Downing Street. Externally the construction is of Luton purple brick with stone facings, the inside being made of Italian terrazzo, a kind of marble set in cement, this having proved the most effective material for cleaning purposes. There is also a changing room annexed, complete with drying horses, to be used by out-College men at a small charge. There are eight porcelain "slipper" baths and sixteen shower or "lassar" baths. The really unique feature of these latter is that the dressing boxes which surround them are permanently kept at a separate, lower temperature, thereby enabling the inner room to be kept at a constant heat. This experiment, which has never been tried before in Cambridge, if indeed in precisely the same manner anywhere in England, has proved a remarkable success. There is an ample supply of hot water, even under the most serious pressure, when the place is as crowded as it usually has been at about 4 p.m. They are open daily from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m., and from 3.30 p.m. to 6.30 p.m. The architect responsible is Mr A. W. S. Crosse. The College owes a very substantial debt of gratitude to the Junior Bursar, Dr L. E. Shore, for the time and trouble that he has bestowed without stint, in order that these baths should be of the very best of their kind.

The Life of Lord Moulton, by his son, which has recently been published (Nisbet & Son, 1922), describes his extraordinary achievements as Director-General of Explosive Supplies at the Ministry of Munitions during the war.

"July 31, 1631.

With this wind from land, I bore in among the Ilands, fearing to loose the Maine at any time. . . . At night, clocke tenne, I came to anchor in seven fathomes. . . . I durst not hazzard any further within these Ilands untill I sent the boate to make tryall, who sounded from seven fathomes to tenne foot. I named those Ilands *Briggs his Mathematickes*."

Henry Briggs was Fellow of St John's, 1588-96, and afterwards Gresham Professor in London and Savilian Professor at Oxford, and was associated with Napier in the invention of logarithms.

The islands so named by Foxe are in Hudson's Bay, Lat. 62 00' N? Long. 94 00' W. The name has unfortunately not been retained, but Mr. James White, Deputy Head of the Commission of Conservation, Ottawa, Canada, writes as follows:—

“Personally, I am of the opinion that the name should be applied to the *group* of islands in and off Mistake and Nevill bays. If the name were restricted to *one* island, I would be inclined to favour applying it to Walrus or Seahorse island. . . .

“I will take the matter up with our Geographic Board, and suggest that unless new data are available, ‘Walrus’ be changed to ‘Briggs.’ ‘Briggses his Mathematickes’, while quaint, is too long”.

College Notes

THE response to the circular sent out by THE EAGLE at the beginning of the year has left no room for doubt that the idea of forming something in the nature of an Old Johnian Society is welcome to a very large number of old members of the College. Unfortunately the only available register of addresses is so out of date that very many of those to whom the circular was sent have failed to receive it, but gradually through the assistance of those who have done so and by the efforts of those who are interested in the scheme and who may from time to time come across Old Johnians whose whereabouts have been lost by the College, we are hoping to remedy this deficiency.

In the meantime we feel that the time has come to reduce to a concrete form the suggestions embodied in the circular and bring forward a definite proposition for the formation of an Old Johnian Club. We are well aware that the difficulties in the way of its success are very great. Members of the College are scattered throughout the whole world and anything in the way of a general reunion is obviously impossible. Even for those who are still resident in England the mere question of expense renders anything like a representative gathering almost out of the question. There must be very many Old Johnians who, in spite of a very real enthusiasm for their old College, yet cannot afford £3 or £4 for the pleasure of a single evening's enjoyment. The same problem of expense also renders it desirable to keep subscriptions down to the lowest possible extent rather than attempt anything of a more ambitious type.

Yet, in despite of all these difficulties, we feel that it is possible to form a Club which shall achieve the object of uniting past members of the College in a real society, and shall at the same time enable its members to keep in touch with the present doings of the College, through the medium of THE EAGLE magazine. If once such a Club were founded, it should be possible to raise from among our members sufficient players to enable us to bring teams against the College in the various field games. Already two years ago Old Johnian sides were raised by individual Old Johnians to play the College at cricket and at hockey and although last year the fixtures unfortunately fell through, a cricket fixture has been arranged for this year on Saturday, April 28th. We feel that all Old Johnian cricketers will approve of this effort and while it is very difficult for an individual Old Johnian to raise a team, it should not be hard to do so, if the date, the name and address of the Secretary appointed to take charge of the match, and the

particulars could be announced in THE EAGLE sufficiently far ahead to enable those who are able to get down for it to write and secure a place.

Finally we feel that if once the Club were in being, and if a sufficient number of members supported it to enable us to claim that we were a real College society, it might be possible to approach the College Council with the suggestion that the College might be prepared to revive the Old Johnian Dinner which used to be held at the beginning of the Long Vacation in the College Hall, and we are confident that in such circumstances the Council would be only too ready to give us all the support they could. It is even possible that, if space could be found, a guest room for Old Johnians might be established for the benefit of those who might from time to time find their way back to the College. At the present time the Chaplain (Rev. E. E. Raven) has actually tried the experiment of fitting up his spare room to serve the purpose and has instructed the porters to place it at the disposal of any Old Johnians who may come to the College, and the experiment has proved not without a value. Indeed he has asked us to make it known as widely as possible among old members of the College that if at any time they desire to stay at the College, he will be delighted if they will write to him and make use of his room; but it would obviously be still more satisfactory if the College could see its way to do this. If it is shown that there is a real demand for it, we have little doubt that such a scheme could be established.

Thus we would desire to submit to Old Johnians the proposal that an Old Johnian Club should be formed which should endeavour through the medium of THE EAGLE to keep Old Johnians in touch with one another and with the College: that the Club should endeavour to arrange fixtures each year with the College at cricket, soccer, hockey, and, if possible, rugby, and at any other sport which might be managed, and that if sufficient members are ready to support this proposal, the College Council should be approached with a view to the possibility of holding an "Old Johnian Club" dinner at some date about the end of June between the summer and the long vacation terms. If all Old Johnians who approve of this proposal will communicate with the Rev. E. E. Raven, 1, New Court, St. John's College, if they have not already done so, it is hoped that the dinner may be arranged this year and a meeting held then to elect officials, fix subscriptions and complete arrangements.

One other thing, we think, must be mentioned before we conclude this statement. The success of the whole scheme depends entirely on the way in which THE EAGLE can be used

as a real means of disseminating news among Old Johnians. THE EAGLE Editors have already done their best to report the College doings more fully and in a more interesting way, but there is still room for much improvement, especially in the "College Notes." This can only be done by the co-operation of Old Johnians themselves, and we would earnestly invite all Old Johnians who have any news either of themselves or of other Old Johnians to communicate it to Mr. F. P. White, the Senior Editor. Suggestions and criticisms of a practical nature will also be gladly received. Already several valuable criticisms of the last number have been sent to us, and although a good many of them were due largely to the fact that the decision to attempt to re-model THE EAGLE was only arrived at eleven days before the number had to be in the press, and that, therefore, there was little time to collect material, several of the suggestions have been embodied in the new number. There are several who desire to see THE EAGLE go back to its former character. Perhaps the following extract from a letter received may be quoted as typical of these ". . . I am in receipt of THE EAGLE. *Quanto mutatus, etc.*, I suppose in its present form as indicated in the editorial, it will appeal more to the undergrads of the present day. I suggest that if this insure its support by the 90 per cent. which appear to have been taking no practical interest in it recently, you may still retain some of the features that have commended it to their elders, the excerpts from old College records, occasionally an exceptionally fine rendering into Latin Verse, English Verse, etc. . . ."

If this is the general feeling of subscribers, the Editors are prepared to follow it. Indeed their one object is to make THE EAGLE as acceptable to all Johnians as possible. At the same time we are compelled to point out that THE EAGLE is at present in debt to the extent of nearly £40, and unless Johnians are prepared to rally round and give it their help, there is grave danger lest the oldest of all College magazines may be compelled to give up publication.

Lawrence Balls (B.A. 1903), formerly Fellow, Manager of Cotton Investigations for the Fine Cotton Spinners' and Doublers' Association, and Dr. Frank Horton (B.A. 1903), formerly Fellow, Professor of Physics, Royal Holloway College, University of London.

The *Times*, of May 14th, 1923, reports the acquisition by the Department of Coins and Medals of the British Museum of a medal of Sir John Cheke (1514-1557), who was a Fellow of St. John's College, Regius Professor of Greek and Public Orator. An electrotype of this medal was presented to the College in 1907, and is now exhibited in the Upper Library.

Mr. J. M. It has, therefore, been resolved to create a General Committee of Subscribers to the Fund, who will later be summoned to decide on the form which the Memorial shall take. Dr. L. E. Shore, St. John's College, is acting as Treasurer of the Fund.

Johniana

THE College Library has this year made notable additions to its rather scanty collection of Wordsworth autographs.

Seven of the new acquisitions are due to Mr. Ralph Griffin. The most interesting letter among these is one from Wordsworth to Coleridge, post-marked 10th July (1820), the day on which the Wordsworths left Lambeth Rectory for their Continental tour, but written on the Saturday previous from Aire Street. Wordsworth speaks of his eyes, and goes on:—"On Monday we start for Swisserland—to-morrow afternoon I shall be at Lambeth Rectory . . . I regret very much having seen so little of you; but this infirmity, and my attendance at Chantry, for my Bust, and numerous other engagements, have stood in my way." This dates the execution of the Chantry bust. Another letter (c., 1840) is written to Mr. Thomas Powell on Wordsworth's contributions to his *Poems of Geoffrey Chaucer modernized*. The four remaining, and one of Dora Wordsworth's (Mrs. Quillinan) are written in 1840 to Mrs. Gaskell, the novelist, and all concern a drawing of a tomb of a Wordsworth which she had procured for them.

The library has also bought six letters from Messrs. Maggs. Two, dated April and May, 1832, are directed to H. W. Pickersgill and concern the portrait then being painted for the College (see *The Eagle*, xiv, pp. 244, 252); three to Pickersgill in 1840, refer to the Pickersgill portrait, a replica of which is in the National Portrait Gallery; and one is to John Scott, editor of the *Champion* and later of the *London Magazine*, written in 1816, partially printed in Knight's *Letters of the Wordsworth Family*, Vol. II, p. 72. Unpublished fragments are:—"I am truly glad to hear that you are determined to try your strength in this way, as I am convinced that you have the eye, the heart, and the voice of a Poet . . . I

sent you the other day a long ill-penned and ill-digested letter.

Do not suppose from what I have there confidentially said that I think ill of mankind, and feel dejectedly concerning human nature."

We also owe to Mr. Glover the opportunity of showing in the library four Wordsworth autographs, written about 1836 to Dr. Davy on family matters.

In a letter to the *Times* of June 14th, 1924, on the S.S. Collar, the Master of Christ's refers to an article by the late Professor Skeat in the *Christ's College Magazine*, Vol. XX, No. 59, which should be of interest to members of the sister foundation. The following is an extract from the letter:—

"Tracing back the motto to Lady Margaret, Countess of Richmond and Derby, *Souvent me Souvient*, which appears above the door of the Lodge at Christ's College, he finds that this was the motto of the Beauforts. He points out that in Latin spelling it becomes *Subinde mihi subvenit*, 'It often occurs to me,' or 'I often remember.' But what is it that is thus remembered? According to Professor Skeat, there is reason to think the reference is to the motto of Henry IV, and that motto appears to be the word *Souvenez*.

"The article is too long to quote and rather difficult to abstract, but the learned Professor thinks, and brings a good deal of evidence in support of his thinking, that Henry IV had as a badge a certain flower whose name was 'sovereign vous de moy,' just as to-day we call another well-known flower the 'forget-me-not.' He adduces evidence that the flower is either the forget-me-not or the germander speedwell, a Veronica, which is still known in Yorkshire as the Remember-me. In conclusion I quote a paragraph from the end of the Professor's article:—

"We see that Henry IV, even before he was King, was in the habit of wearing robes richly ornamented with numerous representations in silver gilt of his favourite flower, which was either a forget-me-not or a germander, and was denominated by the quaint name of *soveine vous de moy*, or 'Remember me,' literally, 'May it remind you of me.' The old French *soveine* or *soveigne* represents the Latin *subveniat*. These flowers were interspersed with esses, or gilt letters formed like an S, which doubtless signified the same flower, because its name began with that letter. Hence came his badge of esses, which is shown in Mrs. Palliser's book as consisting of three such letters closely conjoined; and this further gave rise to the use of the collar of esses, in which S repeatedly occurs; so that the origin of this collar, which has so much puzzled our antiquaries, is really, simple enough.'"

James's Cathedral, Antigua, 1890-95, and then went to Barbados, where he was successively vicar of St. Matthew's (1895-1900), of St. Leonard's (1900-14), and rector of St. George's.

Mr. James Noon (B.A. 1870), second son of the late Thomas Noon, of Lancaster, and some time assistant master at Charterhouse, died on November 29th, 1924, at Reculver, Sevenoaks, in his 78th year.

Mr. John Galbraith Ambridge (B.A. 1876), of Sydney and Tamworth, N.S.W., died on December 1st, 1924, at Longhope, Gloucestershire, in his 69th year.

Mr. Richard Fysher Brayn (B.A. 1903), of the Audit Department, Hong Kong, died at sea on October 21st, 1922, from the results of an accident.

The Rev. George Edward Gardner (B.A. 1869), died on September 22nd, 1924, at Poole, Dorset, in his 80th year. He was ordained in 1871, held curacies at Hertingfordbury and St. Pancras, was vicar of Heworth, Yorks (1877-85), and of Lyonsdown, New Barnet (1885-1917).

Mr. E. C. Whitley (B.A. 1922), only son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Whitley of Ladye Royde Hall, Bradford, to Alice Mary, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bland, of Blandsfort, Abbey Leix, Ireland, on September 9th, 1924, at St. Mark's, North Audley Street.

The following appeared in *The Times* of December 19th, 1924:—Mr. L. S. B. Leakey (Matric. 1922) arrived in London from East Africa on December 17th (see *Eagle*, xliii, 277).

“Mr. Leakey has been acting as a chief of staff to Mr. W. E. Cutler, the leader of the expedition organized by the British Museum which set out for the fossil beds in Tanganyika in February. He has now returned with specimens, a collection of photographs and a remarkable narrative.

For some few years the British Museum had under consideration the proposal to send such an expedition as this to East Africa, since it would be of the greatest possible interest to correlate the fossils found there with similar remains from the Jurassic rocks in Wyoming, in the United States, which have been known for many years. After some delay the requisite funds were collected and Mr. Cutler, of the University of Manitoba, an expert of great experience, was invited to take charge of the expedition. But its departure was delayed by a strike at the docks, and the stores, including packing cases and such essentials as plaster of Paris, hessian (for packing small bones), shellac, picks and shovels, eventually arrived

at Dar-es-Salaam, the port for Tendaguru, which is the site of the fossil beds, in four different ships. Thence they had to be moved by a small boat to Lindi, further down the coast, and carried from that place by bearer parties to the site.

Mr. Leakey's presence in the expedition was due to an accident which led to his being given a year's sick leave when at Cambridge. He was born in Kenya, and has another special recommendation for such a task as this in a sound knowledge of two local dialects. He knows a good deal about handling the natives, too. Accordingly, he recruited native labour, went ahead to the beds in Tendaguru (where the Germans before the war had made many interesting discoveries of fossil bones) and selected a site for a camp. That involved a march of 56 miles, of which only the first ten were made on a track. The remainder of the journey was through broken country, overgrown and difficult of penetration, and abounding in wild life. The march took four days, and then the work of building a camp out of grass and bamboo was begun. This stands—Mr. Cutler himself is working there yet—on the top of a small hill. At the foot of the hill a second camp was built for the 90 native workmen. This is a wild region, cut by many deep ravines, and thickly covered with elephant grass 6 ft. high and a variety of trees. Leopards, lions, and elephants roam at will in it, and there are snakes without number. The temperature rarely falls in the hot season (which is one half—and the working half—of the year) below 90 deg.; and water must be sought two miles away from a source which is not always without blemish.

How did the dinosaurs live and die there? Mr. Leakey says that the subsoil in Tendaguru is softish clay, and that it is believed that this spot was once on the seashore. The dinosaurs wandered about in herds by the water. Sometimes one set his feet on clay too yielding to sustain his ponderous bulk, became engulfed, and perished miserably, suffocated in mud. And that was millions of years ago. To-day Mr. Cutler is finding hundreds of their bones; but so far no complete skeleton has been discovered. The largest bone unearthed is a shoulder-blade measuring 74 ins. across. This was divided into three parts, and it was a task for 16 men to lift it.

Early in June Mr. Cutler arrived at the camp. He had been delayed in collecting the baggage at the port. After an examination of the ground, which is thickly sown with small bones, sites were chosen for the first excavations, technically known as “ditches.” While the top soil was being removed shells and other geological specimens were collected, and then four main excavations, known as ditches 1, 2, 3, and 4, were chosen for the main operations. Of these

No. 1 was a complete failure ; No. 2 is still being worked ; No. 3 was found to be not sufficiently rich in fossils ; No. 4 has been the most productive, and is being extended. In all, 14 excavations have been made. From these, in addition to the shoulder blade already mentioned, there have been taken a femur measuring 65 ins., humeri measuring 63 ins., a tibia measuring 54 ins., and a mass of smaller bones. Very few teeth or skull parts have been found so far.

The method of removing the bones is rather intricate. Digging for fear of injuring the fossils cannot be done over vigorously, and when part of a promising specimen has been disclosed procedure must be cautious to a degree. First the fossil is wholly uncovered, then all the clay is removed from the sides of it, and they and the top surface are thickly coated with plaster, which is then allowed to dry. Next the specimen is turned over, and the underside is plastered, and the bone is finally removed from the spot in which it has lain for centuries beyond counting to safe storage for eventual transportation to London.

The whole of the plastering process and the cementing of the bones together, where necessary, has been done, and is being done, by Mr. Cutler, though some of the cleaning is left to the native workmen, who have proved apt pupils. Then there has been the photography, and the developing and printing of the pictures, work that in its latter stages has often occupied Mr. Cutler far into the night, after what has generally been a day of solid labour under a burning sun. There has been some difficulty in getting the specimens away from the beds to the little seaboard town of Lindi, but a Government grant has been made to provide facilities for motor transport. Sixty packing cases have so far been filled, representing a find of some 600 bones. These discoveries are regarded as only of a preliminary character, and it is fully expected to make far more important ones next year.

The schedule of the day's work in the camp at Tendaguru is interesting in itself. Mr. Leakey—whose pet monkey was one night "collected" by a leopard—generally rose at about 5 o'clock, and half-an-hour later there would be a roll-call of the native workmen and an inspection of the camp. Breakfast was taken at 8 o'clock, and then the heavy work for the leaders of the expedition began. At 2.30 there was a break, and luncheon was taken two hours later, with supper at half-past 7. The native workmen took one daily meal, at dusk. Shooting food, buying rations and distributing them among the men, doctoring the sick and generally supervising the working parties was the share of Mr. Leakey, who occasionally missed snakebite by a few inches, or detected

in himself the symptoms of malaria. As to the purchase of food, it may be mentioned that in that surprising colony fowls can be got for 4d. a-piece and eggs for a shilling a hundred.

On his way home, owing to the coastal steamer at Lindi having broken down, Mr. Leakey was compelled to march 267 miles across country—an experience by no means pleasant in a region short of water."

THE KING has approved that Sir Humphry Davy Rolleston, Bt., K.C.B., M.D., be appointed Regius Professor of Physics in the University of Cambridge, in the room of the Right Hon. Sir Thomas Clifford Allbutt, deceased.

Sir Humphry Davy Rolleston is the eldest son of George Rolleston, M.D., F.R.S., Linacre Professor at Oxford, by his marriage to Grace, niece of Sir Humphry Davy, P.R.S. The new Professor was joint editor with the late Sir Clifford Allbutt of the second edition of "A System of Medicine." Educated at Marlborough, St. John's College, Cambridge, and St. Bartholomew's Hospital, Sir Humphry has had a career of the greatest distinction, and has rendered the State notable service both in peace and in war. He is the present President of the Royal College of Physicians, and Physician in Ordinary to the King. He was created a baronet last year.

Mr. H. Jeffreys (B.A., 1913), Fellow and Mathematical Lecturer of the College, and Mr. R. Whiddington (B.A., 1908), formerly Fellow, Professor of Physics in the University of Leeds, have been elected Fellows of the Royal Society.

The Rev. Canon Daniel Davies (B.A., 1886), has been elected Bishop of Bangor. We take the following from *The Times* of February 4th:—Behind locked doors the Electoral College of the Church in Wales assembled yesterday in Bangor Cathedral to elect a new bishop of Bangor. The college sat for 2½ hours before coming to a decision.

The votes were cast in an urn placed before the Archbishop of Wales, who presided. The first voting did not give the necessary two-thirds majority for the election of a candidate, and the members repaired to the Chapter Room, where a discussion took place and names were suggested. Then they returned to the Cathedral, where again they voted in silence,

and Canon Daniel Davies, Vicar of Bodelwyddan, the little parish with the marble church near Rhyl, in the diocese of St. Asaph, was chosen.

The Bishop elect, who is 61 years of age, is a Welshman by birth and has passed his whole career in Wales, chiefly in the diocese of St. Asaph. From Ystrad Meurig school he went up to St. John's, Cambridge, and took a second class in each part of the Theological Tripos. His first curacies were at Conway and Bangor. In 1890 he became vicar choral of St. Asaph Cathedral and C.E.T.S. diocesan secretary. When, three years later, he was made vicar of the populous industrial parish of Brymbo, he opened up Church work in two new districts and built two new churches. He was made rector of Denbigh in 1897, and was for many years a proctor in Convocation. For 16 years, from 1907, Canon Davies was vicar of Wrexham, where he carried out a comprehensive scheme of church extension at a cost of about £30,000, and in addition raised a sum of £4,000 a year to maintain the clerical staff and the various parish organizations. He was appointed by the present Archbishop of Wales a residentiary canon of St. Asaph in 1910 and vicar of Bodelwyddan in 1923, Canon Davies was made chairman of the executive of the National Eisteddfod in 1912.

Canon Davies married a daughter of Major R. C. Dobbs Ellis, and has four sons and two daughters.

The new Bishop was consecrated on February 24th in the Cathedral of St. Asaph. The Bishop of Chester represented the Church of England, and the Bishops of St. David's, Llandaff, Monmouth and Swansea and Brecon assisted the Archbishop of Wales at the consecration.

DR. GEORGE PARKER, of Bristol, sends the following note on our Foundress; the incident is not referred to in Cooper's Life nor in the D.N.B.:—

"In 1494 the Lady Margaret, her son Henry VII, his wife and King James IV of Scotland were all admitted as members of the Confraternity of the Holy Spirit. This was a lay society for aiding the poor and visiting the sick and infirm, a sort of hospital league attached to the Order of the Holy Spirit. My authority is Paule Bruine in his *Histoire de l'Ordre Hospitalier du St. Esprit*, Paris, 1892, and the fact is confirmed by Dr. Pietro Capparoni, who in a private letter quotes from Saulnier: *De capite S. Ord. S. Sp. dissertatio*: 'The following were inscribed in the book of benefactors, Henry, King of England, and his wife; Margaret, Countess of Richmond and Derby, the King's mother, and James IV, King of Scotland.' The official entry is probably in the Liber Confrat. of the Fraternity S. Sp. now in the Lancitiana Library in Rome, but as yet I have not been able to see it. Two or three other Fraternities to which Lady Margaret

belonged are mentioned in her life, but it is curious to find this one, as no other royal person, so far as I know, had joined it since King John became a benefactor in 1204. The Order of the Holy Spirit was the great hospital building society on the continent and is said to have founded 900 hospitals. Virchow speaks of 155 of them in Germany alone. It is an interesting question why it did so little in England, but our knowledge of its work here is very scanty.

In February, 1925, C. S. P. Franklin (B.A. 1898) was promoted Instructor-Captain R.N. and was appointed to H.M.S. *Queen Elizabeth* to the staff of the Commander-in-Chief of the Mediterranean Fleet.

In the same month Instructor-Captain R. R. Cummings (B.A. 1893) was appointed Professor of Navigation and Dean of College, Royal Naval College, Greenwich.

A correspondent sends the following note :—The connection of the College and the Navy has been an extensive one. So far as I can make out, since 1837 when the Instructor Branch was started there have been some 400 Instructor Officers, of whom Cambridge has supplied 217, St. John's share being 40 or 41. Present Johnians in the Active List are Cummings (R.N.C.), Franklin (*Queen Elizabeth*), Jago (*Carysfort*), Gracie (*Benbow*), Taylor (*Marlborough*), and also two Chaplains, Crole-Rees (*Thunderer*) and Briggs (*Columbine*). Out of 9 Instructor Officers who have reached the rank of Captain, four have been Johnians (Card, Monro, Cummings, Franklin); out of the three Deans of R.N.C., Greenwich, two have been Johnians (Card, Cummings); of two Professors of Navigation St. John's claims one; the only two Instructor-Captains appointed to staffs of C.-in-C.'s have both been Johnians. Monro held a distinguished billet at the Admiralty, Deputy-Superintendent of Naval Examinations.

Since the above was written, the Rev. H. S. Crole-Rees (B.A. 1906) has been appointed to H.M.S. *Pembroke* for R.N. Barracks; Inst.-Lieut. J. A. Jago (B.A. 1921) has been appointed to *President* for four months' study in France, and J. Fleming (B.A. 1925) has entered as Temp. Instructor-Lieutenant and has been appointed to *President* for course at R.N.C., Greenwich.

A portrait of Professor Marr has been painted as a tribute from his old students and present colleagues. The artist is Mr. Kenneth Green, and the picture will be hung in the Sedgwick Museum. The presentation was made at a gathering held in the Museum on May 30th, the Vice-Chancellor presiding. Dr. E. J. Garwood, Professor at University College, London, spoke on behalf of the subscribers, and the Vice-Chancellor, himself a former student, accepted the picture for the University; both speakers dwelling upon Professor Marr's eminent services to Geology, and especially upon the cordial relations which he has always maintained with his pupils. Professor Marr in reply expressed his deep gratification, and touched briefly on some aspects of his forty years' connection with geological teaching at Cambridge.

A memorial has been placed in the Parish Church of Daisy Hill, to the Rev. H. H. Oliver (B.A. 1875), Curate and Vicar for some 35 years there.

It takes the form of a very beautiful "Opus sectile" Tablet, representing our Saviour as "The Good Shepherd,"

and His sheep below; the framework being of alabaster. The inscription reads :—"This memorial is erected to the Glory of God and in memory of the Rev. Henry Huntley Oliver, B.A., first Vicar of this Church, 1881-1911, by Congregation and Friends."

A large congregation attended the dedication service. It was conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. G. Ogden, and the Tablet was dedicated by the Rev. James Oliver, M.A. (of St. John's, B.A. 1872), Rector of Cowlam, brother of the late Vicar, who also preached the sermon, from the words, "Let me go for the day breaketh," Gen. 32, v. 26.

We take the following from *Nature* of November 28th, 1925:—

“Birthday congratulations are due to Prof. J. Ambrose Fleming, who will be seventy-six years of age on November 29th. Son of that well-known divine, the Rev. Dr. James Fleming, he was born at Lancaster on November 29th, 1849. He was educated in the first instance at University College, London, and at St. John's College, Cambridge (B.A. 1881, Fellow 1883), and early enjoyed the advantage of study under Sir Edward Frankland at the old Royal College of Chemistry. Almost the whole of Prof. Fleming's long working life has been devoted to teaching, in University College, the theory of electricity and magnetism, together with its manifold developments and, in addition, the industrial applications arising therefrom. In 1879 he was scientific adviser to the Edison Telephone Company; later he was associated with the Edison-Swan Company, actively engaged on the arc lamp, its accessories, and incandescent lighting in general. In 1899, when wireless telegraphy was forsaking the abstract, Prof. Fleming was helping the Marconi Company. The electrical resistance of metals and alloys constituted the basis of researches with the late Sir James Dewar. Prof. Fleming received the Albert Medal of the Royal Society of Arts at the hands of the Duke of Connaught in 1921, in recognition of valuable contributions to electrical science and its applications and specially of his invention of the thermionic valve, so widely employed in wireless telegraphy and telephony and for other purposes.”

A Memorial Window to Robert Herrick in the chancel of the church of Dean Prior, Buckfastleigh, Devonshire, was dedicated on Sunday, January 3rd, 1926. Herrick (Fellow-Commoner of St. John's, 1613, afterwards of Trinity Hall) was vicar of the parish from 1629 to 1647, was then ejected by the Presbyterians, but returned in 1662 and remained until his death in 1674.

"The principal subject is the Nativity, which Herrick often used as a theme in his Noble Numbers. Above the figures a group of angels carries a scroll inscribed with three lines from his Christmas Caroll sung to the King in the Presence at White-Hall:

'Tis he is borne, Whose quickning Birth
Gives life and lustre, publike mirth
To Heaven and the under earth.

Left and right are figures of St. George—the patron saint of the church—and King Charles I, of whom Herrick was so devout and eloquent a supporter. In the lower left-hand corner is a portrait of the poet kneeling at a fald-stool, with a glimpse of the church and Dean Court behind. In the opposite corner are Herrick's coat-of-arms, and in the two intervening spaces representations of the Devonshire flowers, which blossom so freely and graciously through the Hesperides. The seven principal pieces of tracery above are filled with coats of arms—St. John's College and Trinity Hall, Cambridge, Sir Edward Giles, King Charles I, and the Bishops of Exeter during Herrick's residence in the diocese. The window is the work of Burlison and Grylls, of Great Ormond Street.

"The service, which was delightfully simple and hearty, as befits a village church, included Herrick's "Ode on the Birth of our Saviour" and four verses from his "Litanie to the Holy Spirit," which were sung kneeling."

Johniana

Thomas Manning (of Caius) to Charles Lamb, from Toulouse, October 6th, 1802.

"... Toulouse is a very large town built all of red brick, and reckoned very ugly—but, would you think it, 'tis one of the handsomest towns in France. Every house almost (at least all the large houses, of which there are great abundance) is strikingly like St. John's College, Cambridge. And that they call ugly! Damn their souls!"

Mary Lamb to Miss Hutchinson, August 20th, 1815.

"... In my life I never spent so many pleasant hours together as I did at Cambridge. . . . I certainly like St. John's College best. I had seen least of it, having only been over it once, so, on the morning we returned, I got up at six o'clock and wandered into it by myself—by myself indeed, for there was nothing alive to be seen but one cat, who followed me about like a dog."

(*Lamb's Works*, Ed. E. V. Lucas, vol, vi.)

"There is no mention of a Choir in the original Foundation and Statutes of this College, but in the reign of Charles II a music master and six choristers were added to the former establishment by Dr. Gunning, Bishop of Chichester,* and Doctors Turner and Barwick, who gave a rent charge to the Society for this purpose.

The choristers are to be chosen by the Master and Senior Fellows within a month after any vacancy, "the trebles to be about nine, and to continue no longer than until sixteen, unless their voices shall hold; and the counter tenors to be chosen of such whose voices are strong, and like to hold, and not to continue longer than their voices hold good. The exhibitions to be no bar to any other preferments in any of the choristers who shall be admitted scholars of the College."

From St. John's College I have not been honoured with an answer to my enquiries about the Choir School, and the accounts which have been transmitted to me respecting the present state of the School, under the superintendence of this Society, are such as I forbear to publish."

* Bishop Gunning was Master of the College, was translated to the Diocese of Ely, and died in 1675.

He has made valuable contributions to the knowledge of ice-formation at sea, of bottom deposits of Antarctic seas, and of Arctic geology. The Bruce Prize, founded to commemorate the work of Dr. W. S. Bruce, is awarded biennially for notable contributions to science, the outcome of personal visits to Polar regions, its object being to stimulate further exploration.

Bar by the Middle Temple, but returned to Tasmania for reasons of health. He did not enter upon legal practice, but took up farming in the midland district of Tasmania, retiring in 1886 to live in Launceston.

Taylor was an intimate friend of Palmer, the Oriental scholar, with whom he spent one vacation in Paris, and whose portrait was hung as a treasured relic of College days in his Tasmanian study. Among other treasured possessions were five bound volumes of *The Eagle* from 1859 to 1867.

The Rev. GEORGE WILLIAM DAUBENY (B.A. 1881) died at the Grey House, Southwold, on January 25th, 1927. He was ordained in 1881, and was rector of Hellington, Norfolk, 1882-8. He then held various curacies in London, and in 1894 was appointed rector of Knoddishall with Buxlow, Suffolk, resigning the living in 1922.

According to a report in *The Times* of December 28th, 1926, Mr L. S. LEAKEY, of the Cutler Dinosaur Expedition, has discovered a complete human skeleton at Nakuru buried at a depth of twelve feet in the flexed position with knees drawn up to the

chin. With the skeleton were more than a hundred stone implements, described as “Mesolithic,” mostly lunates and backed points of obsidian with a few bone points. The skeleton is that of a 6-ft. man and is said to be “not negroid.” The skull has a nose of medium width and is not prognathous. Mr Leakey is stated to regard this man as belonging to the “Wayland-Magnosian” period of Uganda. Judging from the description, the implements would appear to belong to a type already found in this area which Mr Wayland himself regards as comparable to Azilian.

The College Library has recently received an interesting gift of an incunabula from Professor GILBERT WATERHOUSE (B.A. 1910), of Trinity College, Dublin, late scholar of the College. It is a handsome copy of Terence with Guido Juvenalis' “interpretatio,” published at Paris, October 20th, 1492, by Philip Pignonchet and Engelbert de Marnef, and printed by George Wolf. The commentary is arranged round the text in the way then used. The book has a value of association also in that there is pasted on the back of the cover the library label of John Rawdon, 1st Earl of Moira (1710-93), the father of the Marquess of Hastings, Governor-General of India. It consists of the Rawdon crest surmounted by an earl's coronet.

REVIEW

PORTH SMUGGLER. By EDMUND VALE. (Nelson and Sons, 1926. 7s. 6d. net.)

Mr Edmund Vale's verse has been frequently noticed in *The Eagle*, but this is the first time that we have come across a sensational novel by him. *Porth Smuggler* is undeniably a "shocker," dealing in contraband and submarines and secret passages and

what not, but by laying the scene of his mystery at a lonely farm on the sea-coast of Wales, Mr Vale is able to give us a fascinating picture of a part of the country with which he is well acquainted. Indeed, if rumour is to be believed, he himself has met with strange adventures, involving policemen and doubles and a bishop, while on walking tours in this region. The plot is perhaps just a little thin and the hero, John Rowan, is a bit of a prig and somewhat unconvincing, but the amateur detective, Bremner, is great fun, and one wishes that he could have been given more to do. Miss Williams, the little post-mistress, who obligingly fakes telegrams and is nicknamed the Love Bird, is admirably drawn. And there are family trees and maps and an elaborate plan of a secret door which, even if they don't help on the story much, must have been great fun to make.

But we do not understand how in the first chapter Rowan took two hours to walk from the Cromwell Road to South Kensington Tube station, and we must protest at the description of the house-keeper in Chapter XVIII as a "kindly sole."

JOHNIANA

Extract from a speech by the Marquis of Lincolnshire in the House of Lords, December 6th, 1926:

"Sir Henry Campbell-Bannermann pricked up his ears and said: 'What a curious thing it is how the same wonderful sentiments and ideas sometimes simultaneously strike the noblest minds. I will give you an instance. When I was at Cambridge in the 'fifties there was a great big hulking undergraduate at St John's College. He must have been very clever because, going one starry night for a ramble, he looked up at the firmament on high and discovered a planet. It was a wonderful thing to do, but it was absolutely true that that man discovered a planet, and, curiously enough, that very same night an old Frenchman, squinting through an opera-glass or a telescope or something of that sort, discovered it too.' And that, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman said, was a very wonderful development and almost a precursor of the *entente cordiale*."—From *Nature*, January 1st, 1927, p. 14.

The Rev. JAMES PILKINGTON BAYNES (B.A. 1877), vicar of Odiham, died suddenly at the vicarage on March 5th, 1927, aged 74. He had been vicar of Odiham since 1907, having previously been vicar of All Saints', Princes Park, Liverpool. He held both the Volunteer Decoration and the Territorial Decoration.

He returned once more to England in 1924 and took a curacy at Runcorn, Cheshire.

THE following paragraph appeared in *The Times* under the heading of "From *The Times* of 1827."

"[From a Correspondent] Cambridge, Dec. 9th 1827.

I send you an account of a boat-race which may be interesting to many of your readers. A very interesting match of eight-oared boats took place on our river (the Cam) on Saturday, the 8th instant, in consequence of a challenge given by the gentlemen of St John's College to the rest of the University. In the early part of the race the crew of the University-boat made a great display of their strength, and gained considerably on their opponents; but the steady exertions and superior skill of the St John's crew finally prevailed, and they shot ahead of their adversaries, and, leaving them some distance behind, gained the victory with much apparent ease. This match had excited great interest among the young collegians, numbers of whom crowded the bank to witness the race, and encourage their respective friends by their cheering."

BOOK REVIEWS

Letters from the Steppe, by WILLIAM BATESON. Methuen.

Bateson's wanderings in the Kirghiz and Siberian Steppes in the years 1886 and 1887 are here described in letters to his family and extracts from his field note book. As letters of travel they are probably unique in describing an extremely uninteresting tract of country, populated by a backward and unprepossessing people, in such a manner that our keen interest is held throughout. His task was the investigation of the fauna, alive and dead, of the salt lakes with which the region abounds and, although the main purpose of his journey proved abortive, we are under a heavy debt of obligation to Mrs Bateson for gathering the material of this book together; the keenness of his observations and the vivid description of his surroundings give pleasure even to the reader to whom the objects of his investigations must remain unintelligible.

Bateson was a young man at the time although already a Fellow of the College and we notice in many places a certain British complacency and superiority among foreign surroundings which is to be found among not a few other travellers of his nation. But in reading his condemnation of Russians and of all things Russian, in which he finds no solitary virtue, we must remember that at that period very little Russian literature was available in England. The great popularity of Russian writers which set in later has resulted in perhaps no greater understanding of the Russian character but certainly in a tolerance of the racial "queerness," of which not a trace is to be found in Bateson's writings.

The book makes easy reading and, although primarily nothing but a record of travel, bears unmistakably the imprint of the man who made it.

Alf's Carpet, by W. A. DARLINGTON. Herbert Jenkins.

To those who have read *Alf's Button* the further adventures of Alf and his friends need no recommendation. The gift by a grateful demon of a magic carpet opens a new era in the history of transportation, and the applications to the solutions of the London traffic problem are considered at length. The manner of surmounting traffic blocks by jumping over them proves too much for elderly ladies and the new bus has to be withdrawn. Further adventures in travel follow including an excursion to the Land of Sheiks, but Woman's passion for "tidiness" at last prevails by destroying the magic but grubby carpet.

Wherein perhaps lies Mr Darlington's moral.

The Yorkshire Archaeological Society. Record Series. Vol. LXXI for the year 1927. *Archbishop Herring's Visitation Returns, 1743*, vol. I, ed. by S. L. OLLARD and P. C. WALKER, printed for the Society, 1928. The following paragraph occurs in the Introduction (by S. L. Ollard), p. xx:

"The attempt to trace the degrees of the clergy shows that an appreciable number were graduates of Scots Universities, Edinburgh or Glasgow, a fact that is little realised. Other facts are the large proportion of graduates to non-graduates; and the remarkable number of members of St John's College, Cambridge. The full figures require an Appendix, but it may be noted here that of the 163 clergy whose ordinations appear in Volume A [*i.e.* for the Diocese of York], 27 are from Oxford (1 an undergraduate) 113 are from Cambridge (7 undergraduates), 3 are graduates of Glasgow, 1 is a graduate of Edinburgh, 13 are Literates, the status of 6 is unknown but of them one is described as B.A. and another as M.A. Of the 113 Cambridge men 52 came from St John's College; Christ's and Peterhouse each with 13 and Trinity with 12, are very far behind."

From a lecture, "Two recent journeys on the coast of East Greenland," by Dr LAUGE KOCH (*Geographical Journal*, January, 1928):

During my stay at Scoresby Sound I was visited by the Cambridge Expedition to East Greenland, which was conducted by my friend Mr J. M. Wordie....I can only express my great appreciation, as a Dane, of the good work accomplished (by this expedition), which will always rank high as a purely scientific venture.

What had remained unmapped of the areas from Scoresby Sound to Denmark Harbour was surveyed and mapped by Mr Wordie....Mr Wordie finished his expedition by visiting me at Scoresby Sound and presenting me with a map, elaborated on the basis of his observations, which exempted me from a great work of mapping, and saved much time....How accurate this map was can best be seen from the very few corrections I have made during my sledge journeys....

One of the Norwegian hunters related that Mr Wordie's captain had expressed his admiration at the colossal power of endurance displayed by Mr Wordie during his ascent of the mountains.

Selly Park, Birmingham, on January 22nd, 1929, aged 57. He was the son of Richard Keysall Yapp, of Orleton, Herefordshire, and a younger brother of Sir Arthur Yapp, of the Y.M.C.A. He was educated at Hereford and at St John's, where he was captain of the University lacrosse team in 1898-9, and was placed in the first class of the Natural Science Tripos, Part I 1898, and Part II 1899. He was elected Frank Smart student of botany at Gonville and Caius College and was appointed botanist to the Cambridge University expedition to the Siamese-Malay States. From 1900 to 1903 he was curator of the University Herbarium and he was secretary and subsequently recorder of the botanical section of the British Association. He was Professor of Botany at University College, Aberystwyth, 1904-14, and at Queen's University, Belfast, 1914-19, when he was elected to the Birmingham chair. He married, in 1913, Lajla, daughter of Dr Klintberg, of Visby, Gotland, Sweden, and had a son and a daughter.
