



OUR CHRONICLE.

IT has been suggested to us that many of our readers would welcome the addition to the contents of *The Eagle* of some account of the events of the term, more especially those which affect our own "ancient and religious foundation:" that such an addition would in particular be a great boon to those of our subscribers, who year after year leave these walls, and for the most part sever the ties which connect them therewith; to whom such a chronicle would furnish tidings of what was going on in the place where themselves have spent so many happy hours, and so serve to keep up their connexion with us. And though this would only apply for a limited time, for as long, that is, as the names which they would see should some of them be familiar to them, yet such as these, together with our resident subscribers, many of whom, we doubt not, will be glad to have such a permanent register of events, will generally form a sufficiently large majority of our subscribers to warrant the introduction of a terminal article of this kind.

We propose then in each subsequent number of *The Eagle*, to include a summary of any events worthy of notice in the college in which our subscribers are likely to be interested, accompanied by such note or comment as they may seem to require. Such matters as Fellowship and Scholarship elections, Examination lists, or changes in the government of the college, may be expected to find a place—with such notices as we may obtain of "events" in the boating, cricketing, or volunteer world of St. John's, who pulled in the Lady Margaret first boat in such race, or who in the Lady Somerset, or who is the last new Ensign. At the same time we may advert to any circumstances of more than ordinary interest which concern not only our own college, but the general body of the University, though this should be done sparingly. "EDITORS."

With the academical year upon which we have lately entered we inaugurate a new system of management. None who knew the overwhelming amount of business and responsibility, which during the past year pressed upon our respected President, can regret that the work, which he bore up against alone, should now be divided amongst three Tutors. The gentlemen selected for these Tutorships are the Rev. J. S. Wood, B.D.: the Rev. J. B. Mayor, M.A.: and the Rev. A. V. Hadley, M.A. The distinctive feature of the new system is the separation of tuition from lecturing, which will do away with the old rivalries between the "sides." Though the Tutors are "ex officio" lecturers, they have not the management and distribution of the lectures, this task being under the superintendence of two Head Lecturers.

The scheme seems a good one, and likely to work well, and, we hope, to raise our entries beyond, or at any rate to an equality with, our former average.

We understand that considerable alterations are to be made in some of our Examinations, but any statement regarding them is as yet premature. Report, however, deals a death-blow to the famous paper, which might more fitly be associated with Magdalen college than with St. John's: so that probably the future historian will find a great blank after the year 1860, which year he will find to be marked by certain strange proceedings in the church of St. George in the East, and by an election for a certain magazine yclept *The Eagle*. Apropos of which, we must acknowledge the courtesy of the present able Sadlerian Lecturer, who in return for the interesting historical notices deduced from these papers in a former number, has thus handed our name down to prosperity.

Another new feature to be noticed is the introduction of a sermon in chapel on Sunday evenings, to supply the place of the morning sermon at St. Mary's, which was discontinued some months ago.

Among the fellows some changes have taken place. We regret to have to record the death of the Rev. W. J. Rees, who has been cut off by the cruel hand of consumption, just

OUR CHRONICLE.

LENT TERM, 1861.

WE are glad to hear of the satisfaction expressed by our non-resident friends and readers at the inauguration, in our last number, of this Chronicle of events passing in, or connected with the College. It is gratifying to us, not only as a token of the success of our efforts to render *The Eagle* acceptable to its Subscribers, but as showing that our opinion of the sustained interest in our doings felt by those who were formerly amongst us, was not unfounded, and that the true Johnian spirit of loyalty and patriotism is still as flourishing as ever. Such a spirit of fellow-feeling, connecting not only those who are simultaneously in residence, but those also of a previous academical generation, it is the peculiar privilege of an institution such as our College Magazine to sustain. The Boat Club, the Cricket Club, the Volunteer Corps, can necessarily only serve as a link of union between those who are actually together within our walls—but those who are absent from us can through the pages of our Magazine communicate with us and with each other, and each, in his turn, contribute, or receive pleasure, and, we hope, profit also. And we are anxious to lay the more stress upon this feature of our work, to induce those of our contributors especially who pass from amongst us, to remember that *The Eagle* may still be to them a vehicle through which they may keep up a connexion generally inwoven with many kindly memories. Many of them can, by so doing, confer great benefits upon their juniors who are still going through their curriculum. For instance, how much good might some of them gain from such hints on the duties and requirements of men preparing for Holy Orders, as some of the former could give from their own experience; “Advice to Young Curates,” not simply theoretical, as viewed from the student’s chair, but practical, as gathered from the daily round through the streets and

lanes of our great cities. Or what interest might be excited in those who are gathered from other parts of the kingdom, by a graphic description of some of our marts of commercial industry, by those whose labours have called them thither!—an article on a Welsh Coalpit which once appeared in our pages, is an example. Besides which, Johnians are spread not only over all the United Kingdom, but over all our Colonies: why should not our offshoots in India, or Australia, or Natal, follow the example of “Our Emigrant,” whose descriptions of New Zealand have been such a valuable addition to our pages? And by doing so, they would not only be conferring good, but would themselves be receivers as well as givers. Just as No. Two or Three, though fairly exhausted and ready to “shut up,” takes fresh strength and courage from the thought of those who are beside him on the bank, and watching with keen interest the issue of the race, and pulls manfully on till the louder and still louder cheers tell him that his “pluck” is repaid, and the bump made; so the Curate, when disheartened by the degradation which he sees around him, will be nerved afresh for his work by the thought that his old companions are watching his course with kindly eyes, and wishing him God-speed. And as the school-boy’s eye is quickened often in his holiday rambles by the thought of the account he has to give of them on his return, so the eye of “Our Emigrant,” ever on the watch for something of which he may give an account to his readers at home, will become more and more acute to observe the beauties of nature around him.

The first part of our task this term is a melancholy one. We have to add to the list of vacant fellowships another vacant by death. Mr. C. J. Newbery, graduated as third Wrangler in 1853, and was elected a Fellow of the College in 1854. For some years he acted as Assistant Tutor, and in that capacity his personal kindness won no less respect than his able lectures. But the main feature of his life as a Fellow was his readiness on all occasions to identify himself with the Undergraduates, and to enter with heart and soul into every scheme for the promotion of healthy exercise and relaxation. A Johnian eleven was not complete, unless he formed one of the number—and when the Volunteer movement spread so quickly over the country, he was most active in organising a distinct company of the members of this College, and as Captain of that Company himself, won golden opinions. His loss has been, and will even yet be severely felt among us. Mr. Newbery had been

appointed one of the Moderators for the year 1861, but his illness obliged him to relinquish the post, which was supplied by Mr. A. V. Hadley.

Though again denied the honour of heading the list of the Mathematical Tripos, our College has not proved a traitor to its ancient reputation. Of 29 of its members who went in, 12 are Wranglers, (5 of them in the first ten,) 9 are Senior Optimes and 8 Junior Optimes. The result of the Classical Tripos will not be known till after the time that *The Eagle* will be in our Subscribers' hands.

At the public examinations of the Students of the Inns of Court, held this term, the Council of Legal Education awarded the studentship of 50 guineas per annum to Mr. Henry Ludlow of this College.

The Master and Seniors have given notice that there will be an Examination for Scholarships, commencing on Thursday, June 6th. This year four Minor Scholarships are to be awarded, of the value of £50. per annum, tenable for two years, or till election to a Foundation Scholarship;

An important Meeting was held in the Combination Room, on Thursday Evening, March 7th, for the purpose of agreeing to new Laws for the regulation of the Cricket Club. The Rev. W. C. Sharpe gave expression to the wish of the Master and Fellows to carry on the work they had begun, in setting apart a plot of ground for a Cricket Field, by promoting, to the best of their power, such schemes for securing healthy exercise and amusement for the Undergraduates, and themselves occasionally mingling with them in such sports. As nothing is yet definitely settled, we are obliged to postpone further details till our next Number, when we hope to give an account of the new constitution. The Club is, of course, to play hereafter on the College Ground.

The University Rifle Corps have met, as usual, for Battalion Drill once a-week, but their musters have been smaller than usual. On Wednesday, March 6th, they had

their first march out to Madingley, and went through various skirmishing evolutions.

The University Boat is, at the present time, in hard training. We are glad to hear that we are likely to have St. John's again represented in it, by Mr. W. H. Tarleton, the first Captain of the Lady Margaret Club.

The Cambridge University Musical Society has given one of its best Concerts this Term, in King's College Hall, which was kindly lent for the occasion, the Town Hall being destitute of stairs, and pending its removal. Mendelssohn's music to the "*Œdipus Coloneus*" was performed, with a second part, the programme of which was miscellaneous. H. R. H. the Prince of Wales was one of the audience.

The University Pulpit has been held, during this Term, by the Rev. Dr. Kennedy, the Ven. Archdeacon France, B.D., and the Rev. T. J. Rowsell, M.A., all of this College.

The Vice-Chancellor has just received a munificent donation of £500., invested in the funds, from some friends of the late Ven. Archdeacon Hare, for the purpose of founding a Prize, to be called the "*Hare Prize*." It is to be given once in every four years, for the best Essay on some subject connected with the history or philosophy of Ancient Greece and Rome.

The Cambridge University Commissioners have just brought their labours to an end, by publishing the new Statutes of King's, Emmanuel, St. Peter's, Clare, Corpus Christi, and Downing Colleges.

Most of our readers will be aware, before this, of the great loss which the literary world has sustained by the death of Dr. Donaldson. A most able philologist, he was the one of modern scholars who, above all others, maintained abroad the reputation of English Scholarship, and his place amongst us it will be very difficult to fill. He had been appointed to examine for the Classical Tripos, so that the University has this year lost an Examiner for each Tripos by an untimely death. Dr. Donaldson was engaged, up to the commencement of his last illness, on a Greek-English Lexicon, which he has left uncompleted. This, and the re-editing of some of his older works, seem to have proved too much for his strength.

Just as we are going to press, we are able to record the award of University Scholarships. The Craven Scholar is Mr. R. K. Wilson, of King's College. The Porson Scholar is Mr. Arthur Sidgwick, of Trinity College. The Browne Scholar is Mr. W. H. Stone, of Trinity College.

EASTER TERM, 1861.

THERE are, I should think, but few men who have spent their three years at Cambridge, who do not look back upon their May Terms as the pleasantest part of their time here.

An interesting essay might be written on the elements which make up this pleasure. Of course first and foremost is the great charm of female society of which so many of us are temporarily deprived, and the pleasure to those who do not enjoy that, of meeting among the usual haunts of familiar faces of town and gown, faces before unknown, but all lit up with enjoyment: but there are other constituents too of the pleasure in question. There is the idea of being at the head of an establishment, so to speak, and doing the honours of it to your visitors: there is the pride which a man will naturally feel in introducing parents or sisters to his friends in College. It is well for us to have once in a way these gentle reminders that there are slight rules of polite society, that there are ladies to whom we owe our devoir of respect and attention. Those of our readers who are at present in residence, have had a fair amount of this during the past week, and I doubt not there are some hearts feeling somewhat novel sensations at the sudden termination of the few moments of bliss they have enjoyed, especially if it be succeeded, as in some cases it is, by the pains and perils of the Senate-House. And doubtless some Mary Porter returned to some country vicarage, feels some little pang at the separation from that dear Tom Brown.

The transfer of the congregation for the conferring of

Honorary Degrees and the reciting of Prize Exercises, which has always been associated with the somewhat late Commencement, to the middle of the May Term, has formed a nucleus for a week of festivities, in which Oxford, by its Commemoration Week, has always heretofore had the advantage of us. The gaieties were ushered in as usual by the Boat-Races, an account of which will be found later in this Article. On Tuesday, May 14th, Cambridge was honoured with a visit from its Chancellor, on the occasion of the Rede Lecture, delivered this year by Professor Willis. The subject of the lecture was very interesting, "The History of Trinity College, Social and Architectural, from the Foundation of King's Hall and Michael House to the present time." The Professor, however, confined himself almost entirely to the latter, which rendered his lecture less interesting to the mass of those who heard it, to say nothing of those who could not hear, and who formed a large proportion of those present. The Chancellor's visit only lasted for a few hours.

On Saturday, May 18th, the town was the scene of a great martial display. The Volunteers of the Inns of Court in conjunction with our own Corps, were reviewed on Parker's Piece by General M'Murdo, in the presence of H. R. H. the Prince of Wales, and a numerous body of spectators. The details of the review our readers will have seen elsewhere—suffice it to say that the whole was quite a success. The members of the Inns of Court were entertained at dinner by the different Colleges, and seemed highly gratified with the hospitality they received. Nearly seventy of them dined in the hall of St. John's, with the Fellows of the College, and those Volunteers of No. 2 Company, who had joined in the Review, all the Riflemen being in uniform. In the evening the Procession of the Boats took place, and was better attended than we have seen it for some time: the band of the C. U. V. R. C. playing during the time in the grounds of King's College.

The hundredth Concert of the University Musical Society took place in the hall of Caius College on the evening of Monday, the 20th. The first part of the programme consisted of Mendelssohn's Music to the Antigone of Sophocles, Professor W. Sterndale Bennett conducting, and Professor Kingsley reading the dialogue: the second part was of a miscellaneous classical kind. The room was very much crowded; indeed the applications for tickets considerably exceeded the available space.

Tuesday was the day fixed for the conferring of Honorary Degrees. Seldom has our Senate-House witnessed such a crowd as were assembled then within its walls. The admission to the body of the building for persons not members of the University, was by tickets. The Undergraduates' gallery was crowded to suffocation within a few minutes of the opening of the doors; many having been attracted by a rumour that the Chancellor was to be present in person. The following degrees were conferred: that of Doctor of Divinity, *honoris causa*, on the Rev. Frederic Gell, B.D. of Christ's College, Bishop Designate of Madras; that of Doctor in Civil Law, *honoris causa*, on the Earl of Elgin; Vicount Stratford de Redcliffe; Sir W. R. Hamilton; Sir Roderick I. Murchison; Major-General Sabine; Dr. Robinson of Trinity College, Dublin; Mr. John Lothrop Motley, author of the History of the Dutch Republic; and Mr. George Grote, the Historian of Greece. At the conclusion of this ceremony, the following gentlemen recited their exercises:—

Henry Lee Warner of St. John's College, his Exercise for the Camden medal; subject: "*Alpinæ vives*."

Arthur Sidgwick, Trinity College, his Greek Ode; subject: "*Tantalus*."

Augustus Austen Leigh, King's College, his Latin Ode; subject: "*Padus Flavius*."

Henry Yates Thompson, Trinity College, his Greek and Latin Epigrams.

Charles Edward Graves, and Henry Whitehead Moss, of St. John's College, their Exercises for the Porson Prize.

Frederick William Henry Myers, Trinity College, his English Poem for the Chancellor's Medal.

On Wednesday afternoon the Horticultural Society held their annual show in the grounds of King's College. H. R. H. the Prince of Wales was present, and the concourse of people was, if anything, larger and gayer than usual. This was the close of the festivities.

The particulars of the appointment of the late Hulsean Professor to the Deanery of Exeter, and the high compliment with which it was accompanied, are two well known to require repetition here. Evans, late Fellow of this College, retires through ill health from the post which he has ably occupied for twenty-three years.

On the second of November last, the new rifle-butts of the University Corps were opened, and a rifle challenge-cup, presented by the honorary Colonel of the Corps, the Prince of Wales. We regret to say that hitherto the number of recruits among the freshmen of this College has been but barely sufficient to maintain the credit of the Johnian Company, or requite the zeal and energy of its captain and officers.

LENT TERM, 1862.

WE are glad to present to our readers this term an abundant answer to our appeal of last Lent Term. They will find in our pages communications from our friends in different parts of the globe,—letters from Rome, from Madeira, from the Pacific,—which we hope will not fail to keep up a feeling of mutual kindness between those of us who remain here, and those who are scattered over the face of the earth.

The year has opened upon us but mournfully. The loss which the nation has had to deplore in the death of the Prince Consort, has doubly affected us, who lose thereby our former Chancellor. It is not for us to add anything to the tribute of praise which has been paid on all sides to his memory: but as regards his work as Chancellor, we believe that his merits have been underrated, and that the interest which he took in University affairs was deeper and more frequently manifested than many imagined. The election of the Duke of Devonshire as his successor we need scarcely put on record here.

In some respects the chronicle of this term is cheering to us. Though our neighbour has again carried off the “blue riband” both in Mathematics and Classics, St. John’s is in both cases successful in claiming “proximos honores.” The Mathematical list shows the now almost usual six in the first ten, while of the thirty-two wranglers, St. John’s has thirteen; of the remaining six candidates, four are senior optimes and two junior optimes. In the Classical Tripes also we have four in the First Class.

Other successes which we have to record are (1) the Craven University Scholarship awarded to Mr. H. W. Moss, (2) the Second Smith’s prize awarded to Ds Laing, and (3) the Chancellor’s Medal for Legal Studies adjudged to Ds Freeman.

RULE 3. That the Cup be shot for with the Government pattern Long Enfield Rifle at the following ranges:—200, 300, 500, 600 yards, 5 shots at each range, minimum pull of trigger 6 lbs.

RULE 8. That on a day towards the end of the Easter Term in each year, to be fixed by the Captain of the Company, the winners of the three Terms in that year contend for a small silver cup, of uniform pattern, value £3.

We hear that the Cambridge University Volunteers intend meeting the Oxford Corps and the Inns of Court Corps in Hyde Park on Whit Monday. This is an important event for the Volunteers generally, as there will no doubt be a large concourse of foreigners drawn to London by the International Exhibition, who will form their estimate of the efficiency of the British Volunteers from the manner in which these three Corps acquit themselves. We have

no doubt that the University, and our own College, will be ably represented on this occasion.

OUR CHRONICLE.

WE regret that the appearance of *The Eagle* has been unavoidably postponed this Term, owing in a great measure to the small number of contributions received from members of the College who are not on the Editorial Committee. We must remind our readers that *The Eagle* was established as a *College Magazine*, with the avowed intention of discussing subjects of general interest, and of ascertaining the general public opinion of the College; and we most earnestly call upon them not to allow it to become a periodical conducted by a few writers to amuse the leisure moments of the subscribers. At present, though our list of subscribers is larger than it has been at any previous time, the number of contributors has we believe never been so small.

This is not a healthy symptom; we feel sure that we need only appeal to the spirit of the College for a speedy remedy.

With this number of *The Eagle* we give an engraving of the new Chapel to be erected from the designs of G. G. Scott, Esq. R.A. The following extract from a letter lately issued by the Master, will put our readers in possession of the present prospects of the proposed additions to the College:—

“It has for many years past been the anxious wish of the Members of St. John’s College to see a Chapel of more suitable character and dimensions than the present one erected for the use of the College. With this view the College has gradually, by successive purchases, acquired possession of the greater portion of the ground lying between the three older courts and Bridge Street; and an agreement has been recently entered into with the Town Council of the Borough of Cambridge, whereby the College is to obtain the right of closing St. John’s Lane and appropriating the ground which it occupies, on giving up to the public sufficient ground to widen St. John’s Street. The necessary

steps have been taken to obtain an Act of Parliament during the approaching Session for the confirmation of this agreement.

"The College has also obtained the assistance of Mr. George Gilbert Scott, the Architect, who has prepared Drawings for a new Chapel with a transeptal Ante-Chapel on the north side of the present Chapel. This plan involves the erection of a new Master's Lodge, and enables the College to enlarge the Hall by including within it the present Combination Room and the rooms which are above it.

"Mr. Scott has estimated the Cost of the New Chapel alone at £36,000, without taking into account any charge for Stained Glass Windows.

"The Master and Seniors are prepared to expend on the proposed works the sum of Forty thousand pounds from the Corporate Funds of the College; but as this sum will be manifestly inadequate to accomplish all that will be necessary for the completion of Mr. Scott's designs, it has been deemed expedient that a Subscription should be opened, and that the Members and Friends of the College should be invited to promote the work by their contributions. It will probably be thought to be a sufficient reason for this appeal that the character and beauty of the New Chapel must depend, to a great extent, upon the amount which can be made available by voluntary offerings."

The valuable College living of Frating cum Thorington, in the county of Essex, has lately been rendered vacant by the death of the Rev. Richard Duffield, B.D., formerly fellow of this College, who has held it since 1832.

The number of Johnian candidates for this year's Mathematical Tripos was not so large as usual. Of these however six were placed among the Wranglers and six among the Senior Optimes.

OUR CHRONICLE.

MICHAELMAS TERM, 1863.

AT the commencement of the Fourth Volume of *The Eagle*, we have the pleasure of announcing a large increase in the number of Subscribers, and of returning our thanks to some new Contributors in addition to our old supporters. We trust that the flight so happily begun may be as happily sustained, and, to quote from another page of our present Number, that "the pride and ample pinion which the Johnian Eagle bear," may not be suffered to fall and droop from the negligence of the noble bird's friends and guardians.

The entry at S. John's College has been unusually large this year, the names of 91 Freshmen appearing on the boards.

The office of Lord High Steward of the University became vacant at the beginning of the present term by the death of Lord Lyndhurst. The vacancy was filled by the unanimous election of the Right Hon. the Earl Powis, LL.D., of S. John's College. Earl Powis graduated in 1840, when he obtained a first class in the Classical Tripos.

The College living of Marton-cum-Grafton, in the County of York and Diocese of Ripon, has become vacant by the death of the Rev. J. Foster, M.A., who has held it since 1809. The Master and Seniors have presented to it the Rev. J. R. Lunn, B.D., Fellow and Lady Sadler's Lecturer of this College.

On Friday, November 27, Mr. H. Fawcett, M.A., Fellow of Trinity Hall, was elected to the Professorship of Political Economy. Mr. Joseph B. Mayor and Mr. L. H. Courtney, Fellows of S. John's College, were also candidates. Mr. Mayor polled 80 votes, and lost the election by only 10 votes.

ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE CRICKET CLUB.

At a meeting of this Club held in the President's rooms, March 24th, a general opinion was expressed that it would further the interests of Cricket in the College and be very convenient to Cricketers, if the ground at the back of the College were put into playing order. Various methods were suggested of raising the money necessary for the purpose, but it was finally resolved that a voluntary subscription be opened; in a short time a sum amounting to nearly £20 was collected and about as much more was promised. Since then the Master and Fellows have taken the matter up, and have kindly consented to give £100 to the work if so much was required. A tender was sent in by Daniel Hayward, in which he engaged to level a piece 60 yards by 40 for a match ground, and another 80 yards by 15 for practice; this was accepted and the work is progressing most satisfactorily.

On Thursday, November 26th, a meeting of the subscribers to the Johnian Cricket ground was held in the President's rooms, to consider what should be done with the money that had been collected. Mr. Calvert having opened the meeting, proposed:

"That the money that has been already collected for levelling the Cricket Ground be devoted to a Pavilion Fund, and that those gentlemen who have promised a subscription for the former purpose, be requested to allow the Committee to apply it to the aforesaid Pavilion Fund."

The motion was seconded by Mr. Clare, and carried unanimously.

OUR CHRONICLE.

MAY TERM, 1864.

IT is our mournful duty to record in this Number the death of Francis France, B.D. President of the College and Archdeacon of Ely, in the 48th year of his age. On the morning of Thursday, April 14th, he was found in bed insensible, having been seized during the night by a fit of apoplexy. Aid was immediately sought, but all efforts to restore consciousness were unavailing, and about noon he died. He was born at Meole Brace in Shropshire, and educated at Shrewsbury School; from which he came up to our College. In 1840 he took his degree of B.A. being 36th Senior Optime, and bracketed Senior Classic. He was elected Fellow of the College in the same year. He proceeded to the degree of M.A. in 1843, and to that of B.D. in 1850. In the years 1847, 1848, 1852, and 1853, he was one of the Examiners for the Classical Tripos. In 1850 he was appointed one of the Tutors of the College, an office which he retained until 1860. In 1854 he was elected President. On the sudden death of the Rev. C. Hardwick in 1859, he was appointed to the Archdeaconry of Ely. At the time of his death he was a member of the Council of the Senate, of the Sex Viri, and of the Library Syndicate. The following works were published by him; (1) *The Example of Christ and the service of Christ; Three Sermons preached before the University of Cambridge in February, 1861, to which are appended a few remarks upon the present state of Religious feeling, 1861*"; (2) "A charge addressed to the Clergy of the Archdeaconry of Ely, 1861."

His body was removed on Monday the 18th, and buried at Meole Brace the next day. It had been arranged that the hearse should leave

the gates at two in the afternoon, and should be accompanied for some distance by the members of the College; but the departure was afterwards unavoidably deferred until eleven o'clock at night; and the other intention was consequently abandoned. Notwithstanding, a very considerable number of the Fellows and other members of the College came down to the gates, being desirous of shewing some token of respect; so it was suggested that those present should still accompany the hearse for a short distance. A procession was accordingly formed, which followed it as far as S. Mary's Church. It was a sad and solemn sight, as, bareheaded and silent, in the calm stillness of a spring night, the mourners followed the hearse through the empty streets, while the bright moon shone out in the cloudless sky, a fit emblem of that life, free from change or decay, which lies beyond the mists of earth.

How great a loss he is to the College, only those who were fellow-workers with him can fully know. To many of those who waited in his rooms on that night, while all that was mortal of him was being carried forth from the College he so dearly loved, the memory of many a word of friendly counsel, and cheering encouragement, of many an act of thoughtful kindness, in years gone by, returned, and deepened the sorrow for the loss of one, whose voice was ever raised against all that was mean and underhand, whose cheerful hearty welcome ever greeted all who sought his advice, and whose clear good sense and upright heart ever suggested the most expedient mode of doing what was right. Our College has had to mourn the death of members more distinguished in the eyes of the world, but perhaps never the loss of a son, more ungrudging in his service or more loyal in his love.

The festival of S. John the Evangelist ante Portam Latinam was this year marked by an event of great interest in the annals of the College. Some time past we presented to our readers a copy of the design for a new Chapel; the work was begun in the summer of the past year, and it was resolved to mark one of the two great College festivals by laying a corner-stone of the rising building at the conclusion of the usual service in Commemoration of Benefactors. The day was fortunately fine and warm, though cloudy, and a large number of spectators were present, including among them many old members of the College, the latter, together with

the guests invited by the Society, were admitted to the present Chapel, the rest by ticket to the building yard.

The service in Chapel began at a quarter past three, in the following order :

The Communion Services read by the Deans :

Sanctus and Kyrie Eleison—(Garrett in E)

After the Nicene Creed, an eloquent sermon was preached on Isai. xxviii. 16, by the Rev. W. Selwyn, B.D., Lady Margaret Professor of Divinity, and formerly Fellow of the College. As some thoughts suggested by it are placed before our readers on another page, we need not enlarge upon it.

The list of benefactors was then read :

Psalm cxlviii-ix (Chant No. 108) cl. (Chant No. 1.)

The Lesson, Ecclesiastes xlv. 1—8.

Te Deum, (Wesley in F).

Responses.

Commemoration prayer, followed by the Collects for 4th and 7th Sunday after Trinity, and for All Saints.

Commemoration Anthem, (O give thanks—Walmisley).

General Thanksgiving, the 4th and the last Collects subjoined to the Communion Service. The Blessing.

The choristers then left the Chapel, and a procession was formed.

The College choir was strengthened by four boys from that of Trinity, and by about thirty volunteers from the Fellows and other Members of the College. The following was the order of the procession :

The Choir, conducted by G. M. Garrett, Esq., Mus. B. Organist.

The Master of the College, accompanied by the Vice Chancellor, Heads of Colleges, Professors, the Architect, G. G. Scott, Esq., and a few of the Guests, Fellows of the College, Guests, Bachelors and Undergraduates of the College.

The following Hymn was sung by the Choir to a Chorale* composed for the occasion by the Organist :

O LORD of Hosts, Whose Glory fills
The bounds of the eternal hills,
And yet vouchsafes, in Christian lands,
To dwell in temples made with hands ;

Grant that all we, who here to day
Rejoicing this foundation lay,
May be in very deed Thine own,
Built on the precious Corner-stone.

On leaving the Chapel the Choir, followed by the rest of the procession, turned to the left and passed along the North and part of the East side of the First Court, until they came opposite to the Entrance Gate ; then turning to the right, they proceeded along the middle of the Court and through the Screens into the Second Court, they then walked along the North and West sides of this, up the Library staircase, through the Master's Lodge, and out by the (former) Town entrance to the site of the New Chapel. The singing was very well done, and the whole effect was most striking, especially when the procession was winding round the Second Court. The Choir were silent while passing through the Lodge, but recommenced the Hymn on entering the yard. On reaching the site of the Chapel they took their station on a platform just south of the west doorway. The spectators who had been admitted to the yard by ticket were placed in the body of the Chapel, those who had taken part in the procession occupied the transept. The corner stone is in the more western of two pilasters inside the south wall of the transept ; it bears the following inscription :

IN NOMINE

The following exhortation was then read by the Reverend the Master, with the responses :

Dearly beloved in the Lord, it is customary in the erection of all great edifices to lay with solemnity some principal stone, to represent the foundation or corner-stone. We are here assembled to lay the foundation-stone of a New Chapel, to be dedicated to God's service : let us remember, how it is written, Except the Lord build the House, their labour is but lost that build it; except the Lord keep the city, the watchman waketh but in vain : let us therefore implore the blessing of Almighty God on this our solemn undertaking.

Minister.—The Lord is in His holy temple;

People.—Let all the earth keep silence before Him.

Minister.—Behold, saith the Lord, I lay in Zion a chief corner-stone, elect, precious;

People.—And he that believeth in Him shall not be confounded.

Minister.—The stone which the builders rejected,

People.—Is become the head-stone of the corner.

Minister.—This is the Lord's doing;

People.—And it is marvellous in our eyes.

Minister.—Our help is in the name of the Lord,

People.—Who hath made heaven and earth.

Minister.—Blessed be the name of the Lord,

People.—Henceforth, world without end.

Minister.—Lord, hear our prayer.

People.—And let our cry come unto Thee.

Then the 4th Collect subjoined to the Communion Service and the Collect for S. Simon and S. Jude were read by the Deputy Senior Dean :

The lxxxivth Psalm was then chanted by the Choir.

The Deputy Senior Dean then continued :

Minister.—Let us pray,

Lord, have mercy upon us.

People.—Christ, have mercy upon us.

Minister.—Lord, have mercy upon us.

The Lord's Prayer.

Minister.—The glorious majesty of the Lord our God be upon us : prosper Thou the work of our hands upon us, O prosper Thou our handy-work.

The Architect then presented the trowel, square, and mallet to Henry Hoare, Esq., (late Fellow of the College) who used them in succession, laying the stone in the following form,

Thus, thus, and thus, I lay the foundation-stone of this Chapel of the College of Saint John the Evangelist, in the name of the

Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost ; and may God prosper the undertaking.

This Hymn was then sang by the Choir :

(*Angulare fundamentum.*)

CHRIST is made the sure Foundation,

CHRIST the Head and Corner-stone,

Chosen of the LORD and precious,

Binding all the Church in one,

Holy Sion's help for ever,

And her confidence alone.

All that dedicated City,

Dearly loved of GOD on high,

In exultant jubilation

Pours perpetual melody ;

GOD the One in Three adorning

In glad hymns eternally.

To this Temple, where we call Thee,

Come, O LORD of Hosts, to-day ;

With Thy wonted loving-kindness,

The Junior Dean then read these Collects :

O Lord God Almighty, Who art the High and Holy One that inhabitest eternity, and yet condescendest to dwell amongst the sons of men, grant that these walls may be built up an holy Temple unto Thee ; may they be kept from all profane and common uses ; may the prayers and praises of Thy Holy Church be here offered up to Thee and ascend to Thy throne, an incense of a sweet savour, accepted through the all-prevailing intercession of our Mediator and Redeemer Jesus Christ. Amen.

Grant that Thy true and lively Word may be here faithfully set

forth, and Thy Holy Sacraments rightly and duly administered, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Grant that all those who may worship in this Thy House may be fulfilled with Thy grace and heavenly benediction, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Grant that all those who may be nurtured within this College, being replenished with Thy Holy Spirit, may be duly qualified to serve God in Church and State, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

After which the service was concluded by the Master reading the following prayer:

To Thy protection, Almighty Father, we commend all who shall be employed in building this Thy house. Let Thy good Providence defend them from all harm, and keep them both in body and soul from all evil, for Jesus Christ's sake. Amen.

and pronouncing the benediction:

Minister.—The Lord bless us, and keep us; the Lord make His face to shine upon us, and be gracious unto us; the Lord lift up the light of His countenance upon us, and give us peace, both now and for evermore. Amen.

The usual dinner party was held in the College Hall at 5.30, when a very numerous company sat down, four large tables being well filled with guests. A supper was also given at Swan's room to the workmen employed on the Chapel.

OUR CHRONICLE.

WE imagine that to those of our readers who are not in residence, the most interesting subject which comes within the scope of "Our Chronicle," will be our new Chapel, and we therefore commence with an account of what has been done with regard to it since our last. It will be remembered that, in the original design, the Chapel was to have been surmounted by a Flèche or wooden spire, somewhat similar to, though, we must confess, not so handsome as those on Notre Dame and the Saint Chapel in Paris. Many members of the College, who took a great interest in the new Chapel, were dissatisfied with the Flèche, and, soon after the work was commenced, it was suggested to Mr. Scott, the architect, that a massive stone tower would be a great improvement in the design of the building. Mr. Scott warmly espoused the idea, and prepared a design for a tower, upwards of 160 feet high, and open within the building to the height of the second set of windows. The Master and Seniors of the College, however, finding, on a consideration of this proposed change, that it would involve an additional outlay of between five and six thousand pounds, decided that they could not in prudence adopt it; and on the 7th of June, last, directions were given for the work to be proceeded with according to the original plan.

Shortly after this, Henry Hoare, Esq. proposed to the College, subject to the contingency of his life, to set apart £1000 a year for the work of the tower, and to complete it at his own expense, if his life should be sufficiently prolonged. This noble offer was thankfully accepted by the Master and Seniors, and authority was given to Mr. Scott, on the 9th of August, to make the requisite changes in the plan of the building. It is still a vexed question, whether, in the abstract, a tower is an improvement on a Flèche, but we imagine there are few who would defend the particular Flèche that was designed for the Chapel.

The proposed tower is more like the one at Merton College, Oxford, than any other with which we are acquainted, though much higher. We hope that it may become the chief ornament of Cambridge, and thus be worthy the munificence of the donor.

The work of building the Chapel is progressing favourably. The body of the building is now about 35 feet high, and the canopies for the statues, which are on each of the buttresses, are nearly completed. On account of the alterations which it was necessary to make for the tower, the foundations of the ante-chapel are not yet finished.

The other works which are in operation are being carried on even more rapidly; the masonry of the oriel window, in the extension of the Hall, is completed, and the roof is in progress. The shell of the new Lodge is entirely finished, and also a considerable portion of the internal fittings.

We are glad to see that the younger members of the College are following the example of their seniors, in raising a subscription for the purpose of filling the windows in the apse of the Chapel. The following is a copy of a circular which has been sent to every Bachelor and Undergraduate of the College:

DEAR SIR,

At a Meeting of the Resident Bachelors and Undergraduates, held in the College Hall, by permission of the President, on Friday, October 28th, 1864, the following resolutions were passed unanimously:—

(1) That it is desirable that a Subscription be commenced among the Members of the College for providing Stained Glass Windows for the New Chapel.

(2) That a Committee be appointed with full power to carry out this object in such a way as they shall think fit, consisting of the following Gentlemen:—

Then follows a list of Donations and Subscriptions, amounting to nearly £300.

The College has just received another noble benefaction, which it will be proper to mention here. The late Mr. James M'Mahon of the Inner Temple, bequeathed the whole of his estate, after the payment of certain legacies and annuities, for the establishment of Scholarships, in such a manner and form as his executors might deem most advantageous. The sole acting executor of Mr. M'Mahon's will is J. Bros, Esq., of the Oxford Circuit, and Recorder of Abington, an old member of the College, who, in the exercise of the discretion reposed in him, has settled the fund, amounting to upwards of £20,000, in the College, under regulations carefully framed, with a view to the encouragement of the most meritorious graduates of the College, who may be destined for the pursuit of the law in either branch of the profession. The value of each Studentship is £150 a year, and each is tenable for four years, or until election to a Fellowship. Two Studentships are already established, to one of which an election will take place in Michaelmas Term next, and to the second in the same Term of the following year. Other Studentships will be established on the falling in of annuities, and it is expected that eventually there will be one vacant every year.

OUR CHRONICLE.

THE Term which is now drawing towards its close has been a very ordinary one in everything but its length and wintry character; but it may become a memorable epoch in the history of the University, if ever a time arrives when the "sweet girl graduate" is a reality, as a Grace of the Senate has been passed, for allowing girls to become candidates in the non-gremial examinations. This is doubtless considered by many to be only the thin end of the wedge, but if so, we imagine that it is so very thin, that if an attempt is made to drive it farther at present, it will only break off. We do not expect to live to see the day when the University Race will be rowed in crinolines, or when the names in the tripos lists will have Da prefixed. We had, by the way, an unprecedented commencement to the Mathematical Tripos List this year, and our only regret in seeing a young nobleman Senior Wrangler was that he was not a Johnian. It was however a very successful year for the College, as we had fifteen wranglers, and amongst them the second, Mr. A. Marshall. We had only six candidates for the Classical Tripos, and they were divided equally between the three classes. We had one double first, Mr. M. H. L. Beebee, who was eighteenth wrangler and bracketed fourth in Classics.

Mr. W. H. Besant, Mathematical Lecturer of the College, has been appointed Deputy Esquire Bedell to assist Mr. Hopkins. The Electors were those Members of the University whose names are on the Electoral Roll. The result of the voting was as follows:

A bill has been laid before the House of Lords, during the present session, for making alterations in the government of certain public schools, in accordance with the recommendations of the Commission which has recently enquired into their state and efficiency. The changes proposed seem to be of a most sweeping description. At St. John's we are chiefly concerned with Shrewsbury School, the welfare of which from its long and intimate connections with the College, cannot fail to be a subject of some interest to every member of the College. In the case of this school the Bill proposes to deprive the College of its right to the appointment of the Head and second masters, and to vest that power and the entire management of the School in the hands of a Committee of thirteen, in which it is almost certain that the representatives of the Corporation of Shrewsbury would have supreme power. The effect of these changes would most certainly be to make the School no longer a classical School of the highest reputation, but an ordinary second-rate country Commercial School. It is to be hoped therefore, that this ill-advised scheme may not pass into law, but that if the Bill pass at all it may receive such modifications as may at least remove some of the more serious objections to its provisions. We are glad to hear that the College has presented a petition to the House against those clauses of the Bill in which it is interested.

It is just three years ago, and the time seems much shorter, that we informed our readers of the sudden death of our late Senior Dean, the Rev. Basil Williams, Vicar of Holme on Spalding Moor, who had held the living little more than six months; and it is now our melancholy duty to Chronicle the equally sudden death of his successor, the Rev. William Charles Sharpe, also late Senior Dean, who died of apoplexy on the 5th of March.

It is a very remarkable as well as a very solemn fact that of the Master, President, Tutors, and Deans of the College of nine years ago, one only, the Rev. Canon Atlay, is now alive.

The College, and we may say the whole University is about to sustain a great loss by the departure of the Rev. A.

V. Hadley from Cambridge. Mr. Hadley has been appointed a Government Inspector of Schools, and will resign his duties as Tutor and Lecturer at the end of this Term. The Rev. H. R. Bailey, Classical Lecturer, will succeed Mr. Hadley as Tutor, and Mr. G. Richardson has been appointed Mathematical Lecturer.

The Fellowship held by Richard Horton Smith, Esq., M.A., has become vacant since the publication of our last number.

OUR CHRONICLE.

SINCE the appearance of our last number, death has carried away G. A. Paley, Esq. M.A., of this College.

Those of us who remember his athletic figure, and his genial countenance, will find it hard to believe that we shall see him no more. We believe that his death was caused by Typhus fever. Mr. Paley graduated in 1860 as a Senior Optime. He was well known as an eminent oarsman, in the days when Cambridge boats were generally successful. He rowed as No. 2 in the Lady Margaret 1st boat (1857), when it kept its place at the head of the river: he was bow of a winning Cambridge crew at Henley, in 1858; and he was No. 7 of the crew which sunk at Chiswick in 1859. In the same year he won the Colquhoun Sculls, and was 1st Captain of the L.M.B.C.

But we would not speak of him here merely as an eminent oarsman. No man in his day has ever been more loved and respected in this College than George Paley. No one ever heard a harsh or ungenerous word come from his lips; no one ever heard him speak or act in a manner unworthy of a gentleman and a Christian.

High and noble qualities like his ought to be as great a source of pride to a College, as the achievement of the highest intellectual honours; and in these days, when perhaps undue importance is attached to mere intellectual ability, it may be well for us to be reminded that a man may pass his time up here without gaining any very high distinctions, and yet, by the example which he sets, produce a good influence amongst us, and be held in remembrance and honour by all who have known him.

The events of the past Term which call for notice here have been but few. The first which we have to chronicle is the unexpected death of the Master of Trinity. Away from the University, his name was that which was always referred to as the representative one of the place, and his death will leave a gap which will not easily be supplied. The Rev. W. H. Thompson, M.A., Regius Professor of Greek, and Canon of Ely, has been nominated by the Crown

as his successor. The vacancy caused in the council of the Senate has been filled up by the election of the Master of Clare College.

A Professorship of Comparative Anatomy and Zoology having been founded by the University, A. Newton, Esq., M.A., late Fellow of Magdalene College, was elected to the chair by the Electoral Roll; his opponent being Dr. Drosier, M.D., Fellow of Caius College.

A proposal by Mr. H. Y. Thompson, M.A., late Scholar of Trinity College, to endow a lectureship at the University on American literature and institutions, the lecturer to be appointed by the Senate of Harvard College, near Boston, United States, was submitted to the Senate during the present Term, and was rejected, there being 106 non-placets to 75 placets.

OUR CHRONICLE.

ONLY a very short time has elapsed since a deep gloom was cast over the University, by the fatal accident which robbed it of one of its brightest ornaments, in the person of the late Master of Trinity. And now it is our painful duty to chronicle a similar accident, happily not followed as yet by the like sad consequences, that has befallen one of whom we all are proud, the Margaret Professor of Divinity. On Saturday, November 10th, Prof. Selwyn was riding on the Madingley Road when his horse took fright at a passer by, and ran away with his rider, who shortly after was seen to fall to the ground, first striking his shoulder, and then the back of his head. It is not known with certainty whether his foot had slipped from his stirrup, or whether the stirrup-leather broke. The Professor was lifted from the ground by two undergraduates who happened to be passing, and was able with assistance to walk to his carriage, in which he was at once removed to his home. The accident was unquestionably a very serious one, but up to the time of our going to press, the reports of his progress have been on the whole decidedly favourable.

In each of the two events which have excited the most general interest in the University during the present Term, Prof. Selwyn took a prominent part. The first we allude to was the opening of the Union Society's new buildings, in connexion with which, his kindly, humorous, and eloquent speech will long be remembered by all who heard it. An official report of the proceedings is in the press, edited by the late Hon. Secretary, Mr. G. C. Whiteley of this College; so that we need not do more here than state that the buildings were formally opened by the Earl of Powis (an old Johnian, whose name appears as Viscount Clive in the First Class of the Classical Tripos, in 1840), and that an admirable inaugural address was delivered by Lord Houghton.

The other event, his share in which Prof. Selwyn spoke of on the same occasion with pride and joy, was the appoint-

ment of the Rev. Frederick Denison Maurice, M.A., to the Professorship of Moral Philosophy. It is hardly necessary to say that there has been the greatest diversity of opinion expressed about this appointment. There are some who regard Mr. Maurice's writings as highly erroneous, and fraught with danger in the extreme, danger only increased by the winning sweetness of his temper, and the extent and depth of his learning. Others, perhaps the majority, know little or nothing of his writings, but have a vague idea that in some way or other he is highly heretical. But there are not a few, especially among the younger members of our College, who feel that they owe Mr. Maurice a debt which words can very imperfectly express, and that his teaching alone has sufficed to furnish them with armour of proof, from which the arrows of the positivism of the day, the deadliest foe to faith, fall blunted and powerless to harm. To such the opportunity of receiving fresh instruction from his lips, will be one of the highest privileges that the University will be able to offer.

The New Chapel is progressing rapidly: the exterior of the choir and apse being almost entirely completed. Excellent views of the Chapel from the north-west, and from the south-east have been lithographed, and by the kindness of the Senior Bursar, copies have been presented to all the members of the College in residence.

The Rev. Churchill Babington, B.D., Senior Fellow, Disney Professor of Archæology, has been presented to the College living of Cockfield, Suffolk, vacant by the death of the Rev. Richard Jeffreys, B.D.

The Rev. James Samuel Hoare, B.D., has been presented to the College living of Murston, Kent, vacant by the death of the Rev. J. Poore, D.D.

The Rev. Hammond Roberson Bailey, M.A., has been presented to the College living of Warley Magna, Essex, vacant by the death of the Rev. Hastings Robinson, D.D.

The Rectory of Fulbourn has become vacant by the death of the Rev. Dr. Hall, who has held it since 1826.

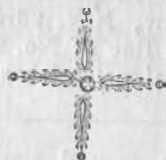

OUR CHRONICLE.

THE present term, though an unusually long one, has not been very fertile in events suited for our Chronicle.

The principal fact we have to notice is the appointment of the Rev. Benjamin Hall Kennedy, D.D., late Head-Master of Shrewsbury School, and sometime Fellow of this College, to the Regius Professorship of Greek. There were four candidates; but the votes of the council of the Senate, the electors on this occasion, were equally divided between Dr. Kennedy and the Rev. E. M. Cope, Fellow of Trinity College. The right of appointment then lapsed to the Vice-Chancellor and the Master of Trinity; and then, their votes being divided, to the Chancellor, who conferred the Professorship. The classical distinctions of the University in times past and present, have been won so often for this College by the scholars trained under Dr. Kennedy, that this appointment, acceptable to all lovers of sound and elegant scholarship, cannot fail to be doubly pleasing to all true Johnians.

In the Mathematical Tripos, our College well sustained its reputation. We had twelve wranglers, of whom eight were in the first twenty, and three, Messrs. Stevens, Humphreys, and Carpmael, in the first six. In the Classical Tripos, which has only just been published, we have five in the First Class; among them the Senior (Mr. J. E. Sandys), and the sixth (Mr. W. A. Cox).

Two Fellowships have become vacant by the marriages of the Rev. J. S. Hoare and the Rev. W. D. Bushell, and another by the death of T. J. Nicholas, Esq.

No appointment has been made as yet to the rectory of Fulbourn, announced as vacant in our last number.

The death, after a very short illness, of the Rev. A. V. Hadley, late Fellow and Tutor of the College, is to many amongst us, a cause of real sorrow. Old pupils will

often think of his energy in work, his kindly disposition, his words of manly and judicious counsel.

His nearest friends know that they have lost one whom they less admired for his rare abilities and activity, than loved for his warmth of heart and generous enthusiasm in the cause of all that is good. The college has seldom mourned the loss of a more sincere and devoted son.

OUR CHRONICLE.

WITH the issue of the present number, our College Magazine completes its fifth volume, and the tenth year of its existence. Those amateur periodicals are few indeed to which so long a life is allotted, and the Editorial Committee feel that their hearty thanks are due to the contributors to whom the *Eagle* owes its present vigorous condition. They can point with pride to the fact that while the Magazine has not deserted its original object, of furnishing an outlet for the literary talent of Undergraduates, in almost every number there have been articles by men whose names would serve as passports that would give them an admission to the pages of periodicals of far more wide spread reputation. From one point of view alone, the state of the *Eagle* is far from satisfactory; but that is a very important one. The expenses of publication are met by subscriptions; but while the resident Graduates and Undergraduates have promptly met the calls for sums already due, the dilatoriness or forgetfulness of non-resident subscribers has produced a certain amount of temporary embarrassment, and the Editorial Committee feel that unless this can be removed before the end of the Long Vacation they would not be justified in entering upon the publication of another Volume. At the same time the sums due to the *Eagle*, even allowing a considerable margin for subscriptions which there seems little hope of receiving, more than cover the total of its debts. Under these circumstances the Editors are sure that the Members of our College would much regret the extinction of a periodical which does much to cement the strong College feeling, of which we are justly proud; and they therefore appeal to them to let no careless neglect cut short the life of our noble bird, but by their liberal contributions of food, both literary and pecuniary, to send it forth to wider and higher flights. They may also remind subscribers that it

was in reliance upon their promises of support that the expenses of publication were undertaken, a reliance which they are very reluctant to believe misplaced. The Editors contemplate several considerable improvements in the external appearance of the Sixth Volume, should they be enabled to enter upon its publication.

OUR CHRONICLE.

TEN years have now elapsed since the first number of *The Eagle* was published, and the flourishing state of the subscription list shows how well the interest in its production has been maintained. The ancient bird has now moulted, and reappears in new and gorgeous plumage; henceforth too its sloop will be unerring, for its flight will be surely *directed*; in other words, the Editors have determined to inaugurate the commencement volume by making considerable improvements in the typographical and publishing arrangements. A still further alteration is contemplated in the 'Chronicle,' which will, it is hoped, make the Magazine of greater interest to non-resident members of the College. The Committee trust that all members of the College will support them, both by subscriptions and contributions, in their efforts to render *The Eagle* worthy of the noble eyrie whence it wings its flight.

The vacancy in the Editorial committee caused by the retirement of Mr. T. Moss, has been filled up by the election of Mr. G. W. Forrest. Mr. E. H. Palmer has been appointed Secretary in place of Mr. A. S. Wilkins, resigned.

Sir John Herschel, the Lord Bishop of Lichfield, and Sir Thomas Watson, one of Her Majesty's physicians, have been elected Honorary Fellows of the College.

The living of Fulbourn has become vacant by the decease of the Rev. Samuel Standidge Walton, M.A., late Fellow of the College.

The living of Lilley in Hertfordshire has become vacant by the death of the Rev. Miles Bland, late Fellow of the College.

The following account of one of the oldest members of the University may not prove uninteresting to some of our readers.

Miles Bland came up to St. John's College in October, 1804. He and Adam Sedgwick, our Professor of Geology, had been school-fellows at Sedburgh, and they commenced residence together as Freshmen. Private tuition at Cambridge was in those days little known, but vantage of instruction from a tutor of whom he always spoke with affection as Johnnie Dawson. Dawson was a retired surgeon of Sedburgh, known to his poorer neighbours by many a gratuitous service which he would do to them, but known to Cambridge men as the great private tutor of his day. Men went to read with him in the Vacations, and sent problems to him from Cambridge for his solutions. Bland was wont to say that Dawson had had eleven Senior Wranglers for pupils, and intended him to be the twelfth; but he was second to Bickersteth, afterwards Lord Langdale; Blomfield, afterwards Bishop of London, being third. Bland was elected Fellow of his College in the year in which he took his degree, 1808, was appointed Assistant Tutor in 1809, and continued in the tuition, first as Assistant Tutor, and afterwards as joint Tutor with Hornbuckle, till 1823, when he took the College living of Lilley, in Hertfordshire, and married. There were those who owed everything in life to the counsel and care which they received from him at College. During his residence at Cambridge he had been active in the University as well as in his College. Strong Tory as he always was, he took a prominent part in the famous election of November, 1822, in which Banks was returned for

the University as an opponent of Roman Catholic Emancipation. Bland resided at Lilley, till failing health obliged him to seek change of climate at Ramsgate. After some years he returned to Lilley, but was obliged again to leave it, and resided ever after at Ramsgate till his death, which took place at the age of 81 years. He never held any other preferment than his living, except a prebend at Wells, little more than honorary, to which he was presented by Bishop Law. He published a collection of Geometrical Problems, another of Mechanical, a treatise on Hydrostatics, and a collection of Algebraical Problems, known as *Bland's Equations*, which passed through many editions. He drew up also Annotations on the Historical Books of the New Testament, but did not proceed with the publication of them beyond the Gospels of St. Matthew and St. Mark. The name of Miles Bland will carry back the thoughts of Cambridge men to days long antecedent to the memories of almost all of them. When he came up to College, Porson was Professor of Greek, Pennington of Physic, Farish of Chemistry, Vince of Astronomy, Milner was Lucasian Professor, Craven was Arabic Reader; Parke and Pryme were Middle Bachelors; Kaye, Monk, and Dobree were Commencing Bachelors; Turton, Pollock, Hustler, and Haviland were Undergraduates. Of Bland's own year, there remain resident among us Dr. Clark, late Professor of Anatomy, and Professor Sedgwick, still lecturing in buoyant old age. Always a *laudator temporis acti*, Bland would speak with pride of the men of older times, and say, "There were giants in the earth in those days." He died of old age, without suffering, and in unclouded mental vigour, on a day which to a man of his strong affection for his College and for Cambridge, had brought always recollections of old friends, December 27th, St. John's day.

The Rev. G. A. Selwyn, D.D., Bishop of New Zealand, has recently been promoted to the Bishopric of Lichfield. Dr. Selwyn was educated at Eton, whence he proceeded to this College, and took his B.A. degree in 1831, being second in the 1st class Classical Tripos and 21st Junior Optime in the Mathematical Tripos. He then became Pastor of the Parish Church of Windsor, and in 1841 was created first Bishop of New Zealand. This see, though it has since been sub-

divided, then embraced the entire colony. The new Bishop received a most enthusiastic ovation in the Sheldonian Theatre, Oxford, on Tuesday, the 13th of December, at a general meeting in behalf of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

The Rev. W. Drake, M.A., Vicar of Holy Trinity, Coventry, and Honorary Canon of Worcester Cathedral, has been appointed one of the chaplains in ordinary to Her Majesty.

Mr. J. E. Sandys, B.A., has been appointed classical lecturer in place of the Rev. H. R. Bailey, M.A., resigned.

The Naden Divinity Studentship has been adjudged to the Rev. W. E. Pryke, B.A., and the Fry's Hebrew Scholarship to the Rev. W. Covington, B.A.

We are indebted to a correspondent for the following interesting notice :

It was proposed at the commencement of this year that as many as possible of the old crew should meet at Cambridge, and with the present first Crew entertain the Bishop of New Zealand in order to congratulate him on his appointment to the see of Lichfield. The Bishop fixed on the 24th of February as the only day that he had at liberty. Eight of the "old boys" would have appeared on the occasion, four others being prevented by duties which could not be deferred. The Master had offered the Combination room for the dinner, and the president granted the privilege of catering from the College kitchens, when, to the great disappointment of all, the meeting off in consequence of the death of Lady Selwyn, wife of Lord Justice Selwyn, late M.P. for the University.

The limits of invitation to the "old crew" were from Lent term, 1828, when on the 23rd of February in their new boat they went to the head of the river, to December 3rd, 1830, when, in a match against the University Crew that pulled against the Oxford men at Henley, filled up from the University, the "Ladye Margarett" won. The legitimate racing season ended the Easter term previous. Between the above limits 55 races were pulled, and the "Ladye Margarett" was head of the river in 1841. Three men only pulled in the 55 races; Nos. 8, 7, and 6 in the Easter term. No. 8 went first Bishop to New Zealand; No. 7, first Bi castle; and No. 6, first Chaplain to Canton.

The Company Challenge Cup has been won this term by Lieut. Wace, and the Roe Challenge Cup by Private T. D. Griffiths.

Captain Roe, and Ensign Sparkes being about to resign their commissions, a meeting was held on Friday May 29th, to choose their successors, when the following were unanimously elected: To be Captain, Lieut. Wace. To be Lieutenant, Sergt. E. K. Bayley. To be Ensign, Sergt. H. H. Cochrane.

The University Corps took part in a review at Woburn, on May 28th, at which the Oxford Corps was also present; and in the review at Cambridge on Whitsun Monday.

Cricket has flourished this year, as the First Eleven is a strong one, and has been deservedly successful.

Dale has played for the University Eleven against the M. C. C. (in which match E. W. M. Lloyd and J. T. Welldon, played as emergencies for the latter), and also against Cambridgeshire.

A match was played at the end of the Lent Term *v.* κ.τ.λ.'s, in which the latter scored 89 and 51 (for 5 wickets), whilst the St. John's Eleven obtained 46 in their first innings.

May 5th. St. John's *v.* Clare. St. John's scored 204: J. W. Dale getting 26, E. W. M. Lloyd 28, G. L. Bennett 29, F. Savage 39, and J. Musgrave 38. Clare obtained 84: 7 of their wickets falling to J. Musgrave.

May 7th. St. John's *v.* Emmanuel. St. John's scored 313: J. W. Dale 112, J. T. Welldon 69, R. Whittington 32, J. S. ff. Chamberlain 21. Emmanuel got 82 for the loss of 6 wickets, of which 5 fell to J. Musgrave.

This match was played on the Trinity ground, and was carried on under difficulties and interruptions, as several members of the Johnian eleven had to leave the ground in the middle of each day to row in the third Lady Margaret boat; and in the second innings three members of the eleven were absent. OUR CHRONICLE.

THE term which is just over is one that has made its mark in the Johnian annals, and will be recalled with satisfaction for a long time to come. The rapid progress of our New Chapel and the restoration of our Hall are signs of prosperity that cannot fail to leave their impression upon the least observant mind. But we have a surer indication of that prosperity in the number of our entry 112, which is greatly in excess of the average, and the reform of our dinner in Hall has at length been effected. It is very satisfactory to observe that this question, which assumed an almost revolutionary aspect in some Colleges, has with us been brought to a settlement entitled to the approval of all concerned by a milder course of constitutional action.

The following scheme drawn up by the Committee received the sanction of the authorities of the College.

That a dinner consisting of, entrees, meat, vegetables, sauces, and puddings, should be served at 1s. 9d. per head, subject to the following rules:

That there should be no sizing except for beer.

That the joints should not be pushed about the tables.

That all at the same table should leave Hall together.

One hundred and sixty names having been entered for the new plan it was commenced on December 2nd, and seems on the whole to give satisfaction.

There will always be a Committee of five members to receive all complaints, and suggestions, and to act as the medium between the Undergraduates and the Cook.

Not more than two Members of the Committee to be in the same year.

Two places in the Committee vacant by the retirement of Messrs. Simpson and Norton will be filled up at the beginning of next term, and a list of the Committee will be posted in Hall.

It is particularly begged by the Committee that all complaints may be made to them, and not to the servants of the College.

The vacancy in the Editorial Committee, caused by the retirement of Mr. T. Benson, has been filled up by the election of Mr. C. E. Haskins. Mr. T. Moss has been appointed Secretary in the place of Mr. E. H. Palmer resigned.

C. U. R. V. B Company.—In the annual returns to the War-office sent in on the 30th of November last, this Company appeared as having 75 Efficients, including 44 Extra-Efficients, and 18 Marksmen, as compared with 34 Efficients, 24 Extra-Efficients, and 12 Marksmen for the preceding year.

The "best shot of the Battalion" for the current year is Private F. Ritchie of B Company, who in his class-firing made a score of 54 in the second class and 39 in the first class.

Lance-Corporal C. Carpmal of B Company was one of the six competitors who were selected at a preliminary match to contend in his final match for the Prince of Wales's Challenge Cup. The Cup was eventually won by Lieut. H. S. Atkinson of D Company.

The Company Challenge Cup was shot for on Monday, December 7th, and was won for the present term by Lance-Corporal R. Hey.

The Roe Challenge Cup, for Recruits who had joined since the last competition, was shot for on Tuesday, December 8th, and was won by Private F. Ritchie.

The Officers' Pewter for the present term was won by Private J. F. H. Bethell.

A vacancy for a commissioned Officer having been caused by Mr. E. K. Bayley's resigning the Lieutenancy, to which he was elected at the end of the May Term, the following promotions were made at the Company meeting held for that purpose:—Ensign Cochrane, to be Lieutenant, vice Bayley resigned, Private A. C. D. Ryder, to be Ensign, vice Cochrane promoted.

At the commencement of the term a meeting was held of the Committee of the Football Club, and a Captain elected for the ensuing season; also it was resolved that the Committee should meet at the end of the term to appoint fresh members for the Committee, and to elect a Captain for the next season. The games were played every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, unless there was notice given to the contrary.

On Thursday, Oct. 29th, the Football Club played their first match, against Jesus College. It took place on the Jesus ground, there being 13 players on each side; notwithstanding there being a considerable wind there was a good deal of fine play exhibited on both sides: the Johnian team consisted of the following players:—W. Hoare, W. F. Smith, W. Lee-Warner, B. W. Gardom, E. M. Jones, E. L. Levett, C. H. Griffith, H. Plumer Stedman, A. Shuker, W. E. Hart, E. S. Saxton, H. Benson, and J. Noon. Although the Johnians lost the services of Mr. Hart and Mr. Stedman early in the game, owing to their being hurt, still they won the match by three 'touches-down' to nothing.

On Monday, Nov. 9th, a match was arranged to be played with perhaps the strongest Club in the University, viz. the Eton Football Club. On this occasion also there were 13 players on each side; the match, which was played on the Johnian ground, was very closely contested, and occasioned a considerable amount of interest which was evinced by the presence of numerous spectators. In the first five minutes a goal was obtained by the Johnian side; and this start, notwithstanding the experience of their opponents who with a hard fight obtained three 'touches-down,' they kept to the end. The players on the Johnian side were W. Hoare, W. Lee-Warner, G. H. Hallam, B. W. Gardom, H. B. Cotterill, C. H. Griffith, F. Bishop, E. M. Jones, A. Shuker, R. N. Close, H. P. Stedman, H. Phillips, and J. P. Farler; Mr. Smith was unable to play.

On Tuesday, Nov. 10th, a match was commenced with the Harrow Club, but unfortunately in consequence of a player being hurt and the consequent absence of one or two others, the play although not stopped took the form of a game only.

On Saturday, Nov. 21st, the University Football Club brought a team of 15 to play against the Johnian forces. The number of players on each side prevented any individual good play, still the match was of a very exciting nature, but our men pulled it off, thus winning for the third time in succession. The University obtained one goal and one 'touch-down,' whereas the St. John's men had kicked two goals, feats which were performed by Messrs. Lee-Warner and Mackinnon. On Thursday, Nov. 26th, the Corpus Club brought 11 men to oppose 11 of St. John's. Notwithstanding the afternoon being so wet, the match was commenced at a quarter to three, our men being at a considerable disadvantage owing to the loss of Mr. Gardom's services who did not appear on the ground. Still the Corpus men had rather the worst of a closely contested match, and had it not been for the ingenious manœuvre of Mr. Phillips, who persuaded one of the Corpus men to kick the ball through his own goal the match might have ended in a tie: when time was called the Johnians were thus the winners by one goal to nothing. H. Hoare, W. Lee-Warner, B. W. Gardom (absent), F. Bishop, H. B. Cotterill, E. M. Johns, C. H. Griffith, H. Phillips, and J. S. ff. Chamberlain. — Coates and R. N. Close played for the College Club.

On Monday, Dec. 7th, a return match was played with the University Club on Parker's Piece, 12 a side. This match was the most closely contested of any throughout the term, and till the last two minutes looked as if the Johnians must remain the victors. The Universitymen began by obtaining a goal in the first ten minutes, against which the Johnians soon placed to their credit a 'touch-down,' obtained by Mr. Griffith, followed by another by Mr. Gardom, and

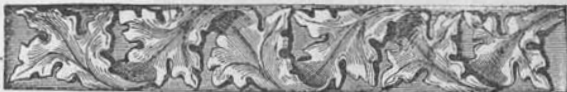

On the same day, on the Johnian ground, the second fifteen of the same Club played our second fifteen, and were beaten by one goal, which was somewhat disputed owing to the absence of an umpire, to two 'touch-downs.' The fifteen was composed of the following:—A. A. Bourne, J. W. Dale, J. Welldon, W. W. Cooper, F. Baynes, J. P. Farler, C. Carpmael, R. Benson, H. Dymock, Coates, Pierson, Butler, Haskins, and F. Coleby. T. Bainbridge did not appear.

On Wednesday, Dec. 9th, the second fifteen went to play on the Corpus ground, and showed themselves to be a far better trained team than their opponents: the Corpus men obtained nothing, whereas two 'touch-downs' were accredited to the Johnian side; and thus the last match of the term was brought to a satisfactory termination.

The success of the Club this year has been marked by many decided victories, for with the exception of the return match with the University it has won every match it has played: this is mainly we think to be attributed to the steady manner in which the games have been carried on. In conclusion we can only hope that this national sport may long continue to prosper in this University, and we feel sure that all who join in the College games will feel the benefit of such a healthy and inexpensive amusement.

Our Musical Society, which is now in so flourishing a condition, numbering as it does among its subscribers the majority of the resident members of the College, gave its first concert in the Town Hall on the 27th of November, which was in every respect a great success.



OUR CHRONICLE.

THERE is but little to record of the past Term. The New Chapel is rapidly approaching completion, and we hope in our next number to give an account of its opening, an event which is fixed for the 12th of May, and will, it is hoped, be marked by a large gathering of old Johnnians.

The College has had its full share of success in the Senate-House during the Term. In the Mathematical Tripos no less than fourteen of the Wranglers, and among them Mr. Elliott, who was bracketed second, and Mr. Carpmael, who was sixth, were Johnnians. Mr. Elliott subsequently gained the first Smith's Prize; the Senior Wrangler, Mr. Hartog, of Trinity, carrying off the second.

OUR CHRONICLE.

ANOTHER May Term has passed away, and its gaieties are numbered with the things that are not. But to the members of our College the expiring Term has bequeathed a memory more precious than the recollection of some transitory pleasures. In the midst of cold ungenial weather, the 12th of May shone without a cloud upon the consecration of our New Chapel. Those who were present will not soon forget the events which marked the gathering of that day. Those who were not so fortunate will find in the earlier part of this number an exhaustive description of the Chapel itself, accompanied by a full account of the ceremony which solemnized its opening.

The completion of another volume of our College magazine has suggested some serious reflections to its Editors. It is true that, when certain enthusiastic Johnians called *The Eagle* into existence 12 years ago, few who had any experience of the difficulties which attend the rearing of so delicate a charge, would have ventured to predict that the years of its life would ever reach a double figure. But the youthful vigour which inspired the early efforts of the new-fledged bird, has all but disappeared with its advancing age. In less figurative language, contributions from any but the Editors are becoming rarities; and it cannot be expected that the Editors themselves will long be content to bear all the odium of the unpunctual appearance of *The Eagle*, while they are yet contributing to each successive number a much larger proportion of its articles than is either just or desirable. We foresee in this, and not in financial difficulties, the greatest danger to *The Eagle*. Its financial position is now comparatively satisfactory; but the dearth of contributions is a serious and growing evil—an evil which we entreat all well-wishers of *The Eagle* to do their best to correct.

Clayton and Bell for the Great West Window, be devoted to filling with stained glass (in patterns, not in figures) one or more of the smaller windows in the Tower. At present these windows impair the effect of the West Window: the two East Windows (containing together about 112 square feet) are the most injurious; next in degree are the two on the South (containing together about 144 square feet): next the North Windows of the same dimensions, and lastly the two West Windows, not already filled, containing 151 square feet. The cost may be roughly placed at 30 shillings per square foot.

This proposal will be reduced to a definite estimate and finally voted upon at the next meeting of the Committee.
