Anthropology

General anthropology, and special subjects such as social life and customs,
magic, marriage, death, etc., are to be found in GN 1-459 and GT.

Ethnography, and social life and customs of a specific region will be
located with the region in D-F.

Sociological works on family life may be found in HQ.

Biological Anthropology

Some of the materials required for biological anthropology may be found
on the Mezzanine. General human biology, including genetics, is in QH,
anatomy in QM, and physiology in QP. Human evolution is located within
the physical anthropology section at GN 281-296.
