

# Snapshot Stories

Snapshots are informal photographs that capture a moment in time.

Who is he about to talk to, and what is he going to say?

What are they thinking?

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
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Who is this man? Does he know he's being photographed?

Think about a busy street today – what can't you see in this picture?

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
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Who are these ladies? Where do they normally live?
